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is necessary for the strengthening of future generations that such laws be passed and enforced. These wives, mothers and sisters who have gone on record before the people of the entire country are deserving of much credit for the position taken in this important matter, and the influence they wield will have much to do in bringing about the desired legislation.

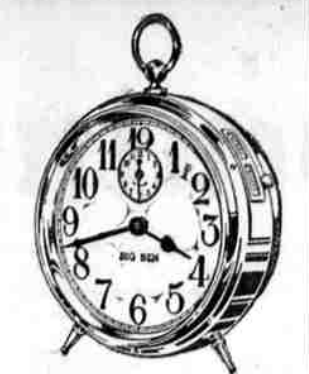

4 " " " 20 " " " " .003
8 " " " 30 " " " " .004 1-2
16 " " " 60 " " " " .009
32 " " " 120 " " " " .018

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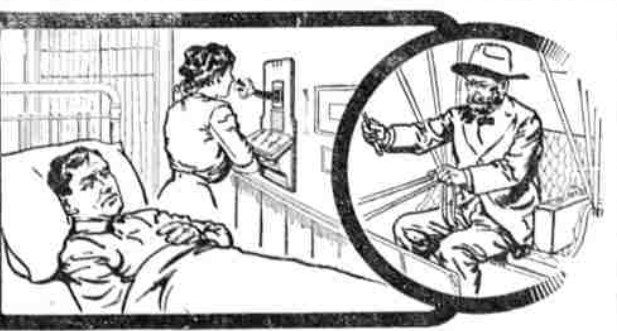
