

A report which apparently gained circulation through some unauthorized source, and was to the effect that six prisoners confined in the county jail made good their escape last night, caused no little confusion about the city this morning. Not only was Sheriff Quine kept busy answering the telephone, but a large number of people congregated about the jail at an early hour—apparently eager to learn the details of the alleged escape. Sheriff Quine was quite surprised, and is at a loss to understand how the report started. A count of the prisoners this morning disapproved the rumor, and was accepted with satisfaction by Mr. Quine's many friends.

Sheriff George Quine leaves for Salem tomorrow morning where he will deliver a number of prisoners to the authorities of the state penitentiary. Among the number are Harry Smith, sentenced to a term of one year for stealing a mule and harness belonging to Dr. Brumfield; Louis Cruz, sentenced to a term of one year for burglarizing the Bryan jewelry store; Walter Pillsbury and Bud Williams, sentenced to terms of one year each for burglarizing the home of Al Hamilton, near Glendale; and J. McKenna, sentenced to a term of one year for stealing a suit of clothes and overcoat from the room occupied by H. C. Darby, a local drug clerk, and situated in the Hinger rooming house. Other prisoners, convicted during the present term of court and awaiting sentence are Walter Scott, accused of attempted extortion, and Henry Bangert, accused of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Mr. L. H. Rhoades, proprietor of the second hand store on Jackson street, who is also owner of extensive oyster beds in Puget Sound brought in a couple of pieces of shell yesterday, that are literally covered with young oysters. It seems that when the tides are young they float around in the water for a time and finally locate permanently in some instances they fail to settle down and they are lost. When they do take up an abiding place they settle in great numbers, often so thick, so Mr. Rhoades says, that their growth is retarded, just as vegetables may be so thick on the ground that they will do no good in such event they must be thinned out. The specimen on exhibition in our window shows the youngsters to have actually covered the piece of shell so thick that it resembles a group of smaller shells constituting the larger one.
