

A LIVE ADDRESS

Socialist Orator Attracts a Large Audience.

SCORE PEOPLE, NOT CAPITALISTS

Says The Voters Of The County Should Take a Hand In Governmental Affairs--Seven Men Control All.

Owing to the inability of Eugene Wood to arrive here last evening Edward Cantrell, of Los Angeles, addressed a large and enthusiastic crowd at the Palace theatre last night.

Mr. Cantrell chose as his subject, "How We are Gouged," and that he handled the topic with the utmost ease was apparent from the applause that frequently interrupted his remarks.

Mr. Cantrell went back and traced exploitation of the people down through the domination by the priesthood, through monarchial despotism to the present time, which he characterized as an industrial domination.

He defined our present form of government as an aggregation of bureaus for the promotion of trade. A few people, he said, control all of our productive enterprises.

Taking a recent statement of John Moody, in McClure's Magazine, that seven men practically control the United States by reason of cumulative wealth, as a text, he pointed out that these men own the factories, the distributing centers and transportation, and in this way have the lives and destinies of the people in their hands.

He elicited much applause by the statement that Rockefeller has built up in his life a larger personal fortune than could have been accumulated by Adam and Eve had they lived to the present day, an individual worth \$300 every day of their lives.

Mr. Cantrell quoted the prophecy of Carl Marx that through the law of cumulative returns, monopoly eventually will be extended to all lines of industry, and stated this prophecy had become history. The condition which now exists, he said, is dangerous as history has proved that no civilization can long survive the concentration of wealth in a few hands.

"With monopoly on one hand, and increasing wants of the people on the other," said Mr. Cantrell, "but two courses are open--either the people must go down before monopoly, or they must get together and oppose it by force of numbers. Organization must be met with organization."

Socialism of industry, he said, is the only hope that the people have to combat monopoly and its accompanying concentration of power in the hands of a few men.

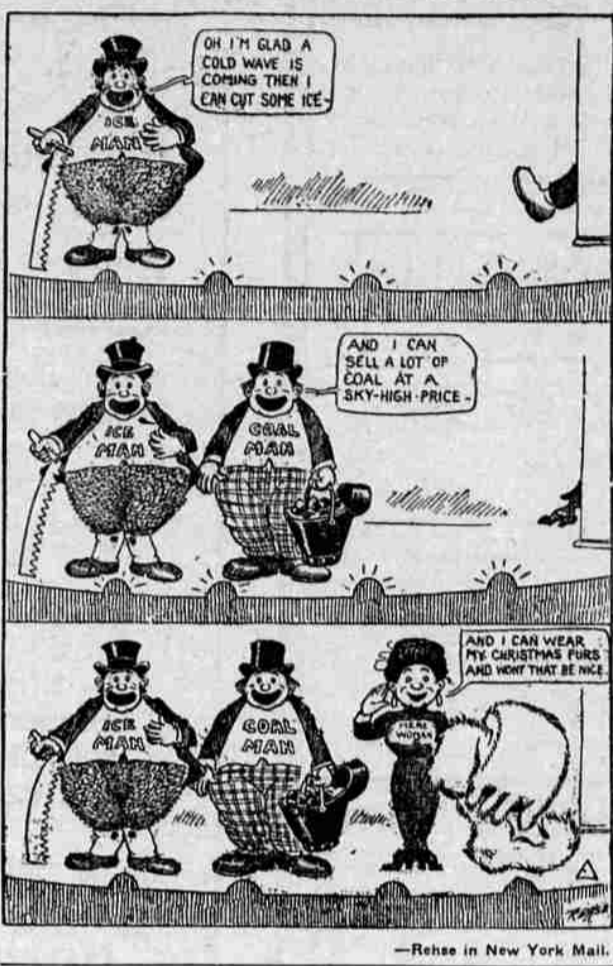

BOMB EXPLODES

Under Carriage Occupied by Emperor and Friends.

MEN ARE MADE PRISONERS

Imperial Generals Brand War As Folly--Rapture May Result Between France and Italy--May Attack Tunis.

PEKIN, Jan. 27.—Seizing 21 prominent leaders at Mukden, the imperialists today subjected the prisoners to hideous tortures before the populace finally killed and cremated the victims. The revolutionists have sworn retaliation and it is feared that another series of horrors will result. Liang Pi, Manchu statesman, who bitterly opposed abdication of the emperor was fatally injured today when a bomb exploded under his carriage. Reports from the north say the imperial garrisons are preparing to join the rebels because the government has underpaid them.

War Is Anticipated.

PARIS, Jan. 27.—Feverish activity in the French naval and military circles are taken to indicate an additional rupture between Italy and France over Italian seizures of French vessels will soon culminate in a demonstration.

INVADERS OREGON

Northwestern System May Extend to Coos Bay.

ROSEBURG IS ON THE ROUTE

Party of Northwestern Officials Spend a Few Days in Roseburg--Leave For Coos Bay--Route Feasible.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 27.—Two strong indications that the Chicago & Northwestern is preparing to invade Oregon territory with deep-water terminals at Portland and Coos Bay have developed in the last few days. It is generally known that President W. A. Gardner, of the Hughtit system, has been in the North Pacific Coast territory for some time, but his movements have been guarded so carefully that even Northwestern line officials have not been advised of them.

The recent close trackage arrangements between the Northern Pacific and the Chicago & Northwestern which gives the former direct Chicago connections presages still closer ties in the way of allowing the Northwestern to reach the coast. The latter road, owning a controlling interest in the Northern Pacific will furnish easy access to Portland and Puget Sound terminals, while the projected cross-state line will open the way to reaching Coos Bay terminals, where supposedly Northwestern agents have been buying heavily of late.

While the people of Douglas and Coos counties have been disappointed frequently as the result of groundless railroad rumors, they regard the above item as encouraging at this time. Especially is this true in face of the recent visit of several Northwestern railroad men to Roseburg.

While not talking for publication, it was authoritatively stated today that three men, all connected with the Northwestern system, have been spending considerable time in this vicinity, and only recently left for points on Coos Bay.

As has been previously published, the Northwestern interests are active in Idaho, indicating that they contemplate extending their line westward, touching Roseburg and terminating at Coos Bay. Such a route is considered feasible, and in direct accord with the previous announcements of the Northwestern company.

BROWN LIKELY A CANDIDATE.

Great pressure is being brought to bear on O. C. Brown to announce himself as a candidate for county school superintendent. It is believed, however, by his friends, that Mr. Brown will eventually permit his name to be used in this connection, as they say that he is well fitted to fill this position.

"For twenty-two years he has been actively engaged in educational work," one of his friends said today. "For ten years he was in charge of the training department of the Southern Oregon Normal as well as being the vice-president of that institution. For eight years he was a member of the county board of examinations. He has always been prominent in institute work and has for many years been one of the recognized authorities on all subjects pertaining to educational work in this county."

GRAFT CHARGED

Said That Insane Women Sleep on Floors.

SUP. STONE WILL RESIGN FEB. 1

California Insane Asylum Said To Be Conducted Through Motive of Graft--Embezzlement is Also Charged.

(Special to The Evening News.) SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 27.—Graft, corruption, inhumanity and incompetence almost unparalleled in California's history was revealed here today in the report of John Neylan, of the state board of control, to the governor, following investigation of the state insane asylum, at Sapa. According to the report, insane women are allowed to sleep on the floors, while more than 100 unfortunate male inmates are huddled in stench ridden attics under disgusting sanitary conditions. The report also shows that Dr. Elmer Stone, medical superintendent of the institution, resides in a palace built of state money. Stone resigns on February 1.

It is said that he admits embezzlement of about \$1,100 and has offered to refund \$2,000, which was refused. Stone has been superintendent of the institution for 16 years.

Other officers of the asylum are accused of incompetency.

Will Attack Taft. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 27.—Progressivism, as advocated by Senator LaFollette, will be attacked by President Taft on a speech-making tour which starts Monday. The president left for New York tonight where he will attend a banquet of the societies of Ohio and West Virginia. He leaves New York for Cleveland, Ohio, on Sunday night where he will open his campaign on Monday.
