TWO MEN DROWNED.
ELKTON, Ore., Feb. 6.—While rowing down Smith river about three miles from Elkton at noon today, a boat occupied by three men capsized, and two of the occupants perished. The third occupant of the boat succeeded in reaching shore and was saved.

One of the men who was unable to reach shore was Henry Brownman, who, according to friends, is about 28 years of age and unmarried. The names of the other two men could not be determined at a late hour this afternoon. A number of men are at present dragging the river, and it is believed the bodies will be recovered.

RESORTS TO UNWRITTEN LAW
Thirty Two Indictments Are Returned by Indianapolis Grand Jury Today—More Than 40 People Implicated.

SAN MATEO, Cal., Feb. 6.—The preliminary hearing of Samuel who shot and killed James Moore, a millionaire, in a pistol duel, was held today before Judge McCormick. Mrs. Moore was unable to be present on account of a nervous prostration. John Bevin said Moore told him a few minutes after the shooting that he shot because he saw Mrs. Moore riding with Chauffeur. Timothy denies this, and contends that Moore fired the first shot.

A Sensational Session.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 6.—What promise to be the most sensational session of the county grand jury ever held in this city was commenced this afternoon. Rumors are to the effect that McManigal will be brought back from Indianapolis to testify.

Thirty-Two Indictments.
INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 6.—Charging conspiracy to violate the United States laws by transporting explosives on passenger trains engaged in interstate commerce with concealment of their knowledge, thirty-two indictments were returned by the grand jury this afternoon. More than forty persons are said to be implicated, and more indictments are anticipated.

A report of the committee will be forthcoming at the next regular meeting of the auxiliary.

The proposition of holding a series of lectures was also considered by the ladies, a committee was appointed to work to that end. The committee will take the matter up with the O. A. C., in hope that the first event of the series can be scheduled at an early date.

The resignation of Miss Mabel Abright, as secretary of the auxiliary, was accepted, and Mrs. J. H. Oliver was elected to fill the vacancy.
