HOLD UP RATES

Commission Will Investigate Proposed Advances

WANTS CONSTITUTION AMENDED

Senator Reed Would Allow President To Serve Part of Third Term—Two Full Terms Not Quite Enough.

(Special to The Evening News.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The interstate commerce commission today ordered the proposed general advance on railroad rates for the transportation of apples from Oregon and Washington fruit districts held up, and ordered an investigation. According to railroad plans the advance was to have become effective on February 15.

Two Terms Enough. WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Senator Reed today introduced a joint resolution making one ineligible to the presidency who has served two full terms and a part of a third. He proposes to have the constitution amended to conform to this plan.

AN IMPORTANT CASE.

Is Filed In The Circuit Court Late This Afternoon.

The Shira Lumber Company, of Sutherlin, this afternoon filed a suit in the circuit court in which they seek to foreclose a mortgage on certain property owned by Charles E. Reed and others.

The plaintiffs allege that on February 1, 1911, they sold and delivered to the defendants lumber and other material to the approximate value of \$2,000. In return they accepted a promissory note, secured by a mortgage. The plaintiffs claim that no part of the sum has been paid, consequently they ask for a judgment equivalent to the principal of \$2,000, interest at the rate of 6 per cent, amounting to about \$100, and attorney fees in the sum of \$175. The case was brought through Attorney John T. Long.

TELEPHONE MERGER COMPLETE.

Service East of Roseburg Will Be Much Benefitted.

At an adjourned meeting this morning at Dixonville, Ore., a consolidation was effected between the six old farmers' telephone companies and the four new companies who had been permitted at a former meeting to each purchase a share in the line of telephone poles from Roseburg to Dixonville. This consolidation affects ten companies. The following officers have been elected to serve the following year: O. C. Brown, president; John McKean, vice-president; C. W. Baker, secretary and treasurer.

This consolidation will greatly improve the telephone system east of Roseburg and will practically accommodate every family in that section of the country. Each of the four companies constructing lines are required to put in double wire or

metallic circuit and the old companies who have at present the grounded line, will install the metallic circuit in the near future.

The rapidly increasing population of this fertile section of the country has brought about this very much needed improvement.
