The street improvement committee, to whom was referred the matter of adjusting certain remonstrances against assessments resulting from the construction of the West Roseburg sewer system, reported that they had concluded their investigation. They recommended that the remon-

strances of J. C. Fullerton, A. J. Bellows, Mary Watson and Mrs. Lizzie Elmore be denied. The remonstrance of Mrs. S. D. Houser received favorable consideration and she was allowed a rebate of \$40.88.

## The Bond Ordinance.

An ordinance placing the bond of the city marshal at \$2,000 was placed on its third reading and carried unanimously. The bond is to be of the surety variety, and in substance, protects the city against loss or inefficient service.

## To Pave Street.

A petition requesting the paving of East Third street, from Commercial Avenue to First Avenue was presented and referred to the city improvement committee for investigation. The petition was presented by the Roseburg school board and Al Cresson and represents about 450 feet of the abutting property.

## BOON ARRESTED

Charged With Attempting to Extort Money

## GEO. ADAMS MAKES COMPLAINT

Alleged That Boon Attempted To Secure \$100—Threatened To Kill Adams In Case He Resisted.

Oley Boon, one of the best known farmers residing in the Deer Creek section of the county, was arrested here late this afternoon on a charge of attempting to extort \$100 from George Adams, a neighbor. A preliminary hearing will be held before Justice of the Peace Reuben Marsters this evening at 7:30 o'clock. According to the story told by Adams upon his appearance in the justice court today, Boon came to his home late yesterday and without the least cause demanded \$100. Upon his refusal to deliver the money, Adams alleges that Boon threatened to kill him on sight. Fearing the Boon might carry his threat into execution Adams came to town this morning and caused a warrant to be issued for his arrest.

Adams says that Boon was never employed by him, and that he had no excuse, whatever, for demanding the money. The participants in the controversy have lived on adjoining farms for several years, and prior to their recent trouble have been friends.

While the officers refuse to make public the entire transaction, they intimate that the developments in the case will be unusually interesting, if not sensational.

Both Boon and Adams are well known throughout the entire county, and their present difficulty has attracted more than ordinary attention.

There were a large number of the young people who went forward and dedicated themselves to the Master.

Tonight Mr. Smith announces a subject especially interesting to men: "Profit and Loss". The discourse was originally prepared for a state convention of the Young Men's Christian Association. Smith and Roper will repeat "Lambard Watch" by request and Mr. Roper will sing "Paul and Silas" a great descriptive song. Don't miss these meetings.
