HEIR TO \$180,000

Inmate of The Oregon Soldiers' Home Receives Fortune.

A short time ago W. L. Chittenden, a veteran of the Indian wars in the Northwest, and who lives at the Oregon Soldiers' Home in West Roseburg, received a letter from his daughter with which the lady enclosed a letter from an attorney at Minneapolis, Minn., who said that an estate of \$180,000 had just been left by a deceased member of the Chittenden family to charitable institutions, but that in all probability the will was invalid. If set aside the property will go to descendants of four sons of Nathan Chittenden, who was born at Green River, N. Y., on May 17, 1771. His four sons were Obial, Johnson, Austin and Daniel D. The letter further said: "I am sending you this thinking that possibly you are a descendant of Austin Chittenden, born in 1798, who finally became a merchant at Portland, Oregon, where he died in 1865, leaving two sons and two daughters." The surprise of the Minneapolis attorney was correct. The old Indian war veteran, W. L. Chittenden, whose daughter received the inquiry is a son of Austin Chittenden, and was born June 23, 1833, and came West with his father in the very early days of Oregon's history. The other son and two daughters who survived Austin Chittenden, have long years ago followed their father to the great beyond, leaving the old veteran, now 79 years of age, sole survivor of Austin Chittenden's family. As near as can be ascertained there are now only a very few left who will receive any part in the estate above mentioned, so that the old soldier, who in spite of 75 years of life is still hale and hearty, will receive \$30,000 or \$35,000 as his share of the property when it is finally distributed among the heirs.
