Wound Cut Down Street.

G. W. Morris, of North Roseburg, appeared before the council last night and in a brief address, said the citizens residing on Commercial avenue, between First and Jackson streets were desirous of cutting down the street from its present width of 100 feet to 50 feet, followed by center paving to a width of 24 feet. Mr. Morris said the street was much too wide, and that in vacation of 25 feet on either side there would be plenty of room left. Mr. Morris said the citizens residing on the block in question were also opposed to the center parking scheme, and would oppose any move to pave the thoroughfare in the manner heretofore prescribed. He said the citizens on the street desired that the thoroughfare be cut down 50 feet, and paved to a width of 25 feet in the center of the street.

At Creason said he did not desire to oppose the wishes of the abutting property owners, but did not think it wise to cut down one block, and leave the remainder of the street 100 feet wide. "The council must cut down the entire street or none at all," said Mr. Creason, "otherwise I will oppose the improvement."

At this juncture of the proceedings, H. H. Shambrook, one of the petitioners for a narrower street remarked, "It will have to be cut down, or we'll see that the street won't be paved."

practice of roller skating on the sidewalks within the city limits also furnished food for considerable discussion. The ordinance had hardly been read by the recorder, when Councilman Krohn, alleged father of the measure, jumped to his feet, and moved that it be so amended as to prohibit skating only in the business district.

Councilman Strong said he was opposed to the ordinance in its present form, and thought it should be so amended as to prohibit skating in the business district, and not on the residence streets where traffic was ordinarily light.

Councilman Zuercher said he thought the passage of such an ordinance was unnecessary and that the problem could be handled by the police officers with little difficulty.

Councilman Mullen, who is at all times a friend of the "young American", said he was opposed to the ordinance, considering that it would interfere with the pleasure of the young people. "I can't see why we should pass this ordinance," declared Mullen, "just because we are getting old we should not sit here and pass laws restricting the happiness of the younger generation. Roseburg is renowned for its pretty girls, and now we would pass an ordinance denying them the privilege of developing their 'physical organism'. For God's sake, let them skate and grow to strong and healthy men and women: I am opposed to 'blue laws'!"
