

OUR EDENBOWER LETTER.

Pine Water Found—Another Business House To Be Built—Big Hay Crop Assured—H. Rinehart Goes Home to Care for Father and Mother.

Charley Stone, whose neat cottage upon the hillside in George W. Jones' addition, and west of the town, has found that the most pure and cool water can be obtained on the hill without much cost—not half what city water would cost for one year. He sunk a well down to a depth of only 25 feet, through rock having the appearance of containing mineral, and found plenty of water of a fine quality. An additional fine feature about the well is that it is curbed completely by the native rock, and will be kept absolutely free from seepage water.

Wm. Burts has purchased the northwest corner of block 23, in Riverside addition, and will erect upon it a building suitable for business purposes at an early date. Note—In the above report the gluten and the ash are expressed as parts in each one hundred parts of the flour. The absorption is expressed as the amount of water necessary to add to one hundred parts of the flour to make a dough of standard stiffness. The remaining values are expressed as to show the relation to the standard flour, which for the purpose is given a value of 100 per cent. The loaves produced were made under carefully controlled and uniform conditions and baked in accurately graduated baking cylinders in an electric oven. The value expressed as quality of loaf is based upon the color, flavor and texture of the bread. THE AVERAGE VALUE expressed in per cent is the mean value of color, loaves per barrel, size of loaf and quality of loaf. IT SHOULD NOT BE TAKEN ALONE in comparing the value of flours, but each of the factors of which it is made up should receive consideration.
