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RED CROSS DAY

Great Convention Began Sessions Today.

ALL NATIONS ARE REPRESENTED

President and Mrs. Taft Entertain Foreign Delegates—The Orient Sends Delegations—Work In War or Peace.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 7.

Every civilized country of the globe is represented by delegates at the ninth international Red Cross conference which opened its session here today in the Pan American Union building. The conference, in connection with which a highly interesting exhibition of Red Cross methods and appliances is held will remain in session until May 17, inclusive, and promises to be the most successful and important ever held. The conference will hold general and departmental sessions at the Pan-American Union building and for all these meetings and conferences elaborate programs have been prepared, embracing practically every subject bearing upon the activities in war and peace of the international Red Cross organization. On the closing day of the conference, Friday, May 17, President Taft, who is the honorary president of the American National Red Cross, and Mrs. Taft will entertain the foreign delegates and other distinguished attendants at the White House. Should the weather permit a garden party in honor of the visitors will be given in the White House grounds.

Among the delegates in attendance are many men and women distinguished for their eminent work in the service of the Red Cross in their respective countries. The United States delegation includes the Hon. Charles Nagle, secretary of commerce and labor; Brig. Gen. George H. Torney, U. S. A.; Surgeon-General Chas. F. Stokes, U. S. N., and Miss Mabel T. Boardman of the executive committee of the American National Red Cross and Major General Geo. W. Davis, chairman of the central committee.

Germany is represented by S. L. Bernheimer, a member of the expert commission of the German Red Cross; Prof. Panwitz, Baron von Pöschel, president of the German Red Cross organization and a distinguished cavalry general, and Prof. Kimmel. Among the Austrian delegates are Dr. Maurice Victor Silbermark, chief surgeon of the Austrian Red Cross and Dr. Yetta Silbermark Reising, the most distinguished woman surgeon of Austria, who intends to make a study of sanitary institutions for women in this country.

Japan has sent a large delegation, including Count and Countess N.

Ogasawara, Dr. Akiyama, counselor of the department of the army; Surgeon Major E. Inouye and Baron T. Ozawa, one of the oldest and most distinguished promoters of Red Cross work in Japan.

The list of distinguished delegates also includes Sir Frederick Treve, of Great Britain; Prof. Mantouff, of Russia; Gustave Adler, of Switzerland; Dr. Ferriere, of Switzerland; Gen. Yermoloff, of Russia; Elent Cheane, of the Siamese army and numerous others.

The exhibition held in connection with the conference promises to be one of the most interesting and attractive features. Major Charles Lynch, of the Medical Corps of the United States Army, is in charge of the exhibition, which is divided into two branches. The indoor exhibition is held in a large cross-shaped building of 17,400 feet of floor space, which is located a short distance from the Pan American Union building, where the conference meets. The indoor exhibition comprises a remarkably complete and interesting display of appliances, materials, instruments, etc., used in the work of the Red Cross in war as well as in peace. It is divided into two parts. One part includes the exhibition of methods appliances and inventions for relieving the sufferings of wounded and sick soldiers, entered in the Marie Feodorovna competition. The other part comprises the general international exhibit of Red Cross activities and appliances. Valuable cash prizes are offered in both parts of the exhibition. The prizes in the first mentioned department are derived from the interest on the fund established for that purpose of the Dowager Empress of Russia. In addition to the cash prizes in the general exhibit medals of special design will be awarded to meritorious exhibitors.

The open air exhibit, which is to be held daily west of the monument grounds, where a grand stand for convenient observation has been erected, promises to be unusually attractive. Here daily a program of Red Cross activities is to be demonstrated. Methods of transporting the wounded from the battle field and the injured from the scene of some accident will be demonstrated, also the various methods of bringing first aid and relief to sick and wounded. One of the two "first-aid cars" of the American Red Cross has been brought to Washington and will be shown in activity at the open air exhibition. The outdoor exhibit will also include demonstrations of new inventions in the line of safety devices and a field-hospital in full operation, with a large corps of ambulance men, surgeons and nurses.
