Sandy soils give quick results in plant growth, while the richer and heavier soils give size and yield.

In everyday life, as in politics, a fellow is quite often as accurately judged by the enemies as by the friends he makes.

The incubator and brooder have this advantage over old fiddy—namely, that chicks hatched in the artificial way are not so likely to be infested with lice.

Being long without water is said by an experienced horseman to be the cause of most cases of colic in horses. The remedy for the trouble, if this diagnosis is correct, would seem to be cheap enough to suit the most economical.

Sunshine is one of the cheapest and best disinfectants known. Not only should lots of it be admitted into the dairy barn and poultry house, but the rugs, bedding and clothing that are stored in the closets should be exposed to it now and then.

Poultry manure is one of the richest of natural manures and should be applied sparingly, it being best mixed with barnyard manure before being put on the land. If one wants to store hen manure for some time it should be kept as dry as possible.

The urging of a better type of agriculture is not a whim, but a virtual necessity, for land values have reached such a level that better methods must be adopted to give returns that will meet both interest and taxes and leave a margin for profit. When land will not do this the danger line is already crossed.

Germany, one-fifteenth as large as the United States, produces nearly five times as many potatoes as we do. Her acreage in potatoes is twice and a half what it is in this country and the yield per acre about twice as large. Roughly, one half the crop is consumed and the other half used in the manufacture of starch and denatured alcohol.
