100 YEARS AGO

Hamilton College Celebrates Centennial Anniversary.

GLASSCOCK FOR RUNNING MATE

West Virginians Believe Their Governor Is Entitled To Second Place On Ticket With Roosevelt.

CLINTON, N. Y., June 13.—Alumni and other friends of Hamilton College are gathering here to attend what promises to be the most notable commencement in the history of the institution. The exercises began today and will conclude next Monday with a celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the chartering of the college. President Taft and Senator Elihu Root will be among the speakers at the centennial exercises.

Oklahoma Christian Endeavors.

ANADARKO, Okla., June 13.—The annual convention of the Christian Endeavor societies of Oklahoma began here today with a large and representative attendance. The sessions will continue until Sunday.

Missouri University Commencement.

COLUMBIA, Mo., June 13.—The seventieth commencement of the University of Missouri concluded with the graduation exercises. The commencement address was delivered by Dean Edward A. Birge of the University of Wisconsin.

For Roosevelt and Glasscock.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 13.—The West Virginia delegates to the republican national convention, who will depart from here tomorrow for Chicago, will carry with them a boom for Governor William E. Glasscock for the vice-presidential nomination in the event that Theodore Roosevelt is named to head the ticket.

The friends of Governor Glasscock believe he is entitled to second place on the ticket from the fact that he is "the original Roosevelt man". On January 18 last, almost two months before the headgear of the famous Rough Rider was tossed into the squared circle, Governor Glasscock issued a public statement in which he declared that a careful canvass of the political situation in West Virginia had convinced him that the people of the state were overwhelmingly for Colonel Roosevelt for the republican presidential nomination, and calling upon the people to elect delegates to Chicago who would vote for his nomination. Furthermore, it was pointed out, the governor of West Virginia is the only one of the seven governors who prevailed on Roosevelt to be a candidate, who carried his state solid in the contest for delegates.

ITHACA, N. Y., June 13.—In connection with the commencement week exercises at Cornell University there was unveiled today a life-size bust of former Governor Alonzo B.

Sterling against his wife, an American actress, was married today to Miss Hilda Cooper, daughter of the late Sir Daniel Cooper, the noted English sportsman. The wedding took place at St. Margaret's, Westminster, and was largely attended.

Commencement Day at Nebraska.

LINCOLN, Neb., June 13.—Commencement day was brilliantly celebrated today at the University of Nebraska. The candidates for degrees marched in academic procession from the campus to the Lincoln auditorium, where they were presented with their diplomas by Chancellor Avery. The address of the day was delivered by Professor Charles E. Merriam, of the University of Chicago, who spoke on the subject of "Citizenship."
