THE CONVENTION.

Early reports from the republican convention being held in Chicago are even more uncertain as to the outcome than at any time in the past few weeks. Taft and Roosevelt supporters both claim vi-tory. As a matter of fact Taft can have the nomination if he can prevent his southern delegates from turning over to Roosevelt. There is no question but that tremendous pressure is being brought to bear on these delegates and others that are weak in their support of the president. Roosevelt has the millions of the Harvester Trust back of him as well as powerful Wall street backing and the money that is at the command of his lieutenants is without limit. Buying delegates either by money or promise of reward politically or otherwise will perhaps be the regular business of lieutenants on both sides. Taft has the advantage because he controls the committee. If the committee can retain its power over the delegates Taft will be the nomince, otherwise Rosevelt will run off with the plum. There is little chance for a dark horse. Neither the polls this fall in any event. side cares to make the proposal and neither side wants to take the responsibility. Roosevelt will either be the nominee of the from his position and support a compro-

mise candidate any more than he could support Taft, if he were nominated. It means a bolt by the Roosevelt forces as soon as the real test of the convention comes which is on the temporary organization. This, provided Taft is victorious in the organization of the convention. Governor Johnson, of California, served notice on the convention that California would not abide any decision of the convention which was carried by votes of the committee-scated delegates favoring Taft. In other words there were 233 delegates seated by the committee which were contested by Roosevelt. The total number of delegates is 1,078. The Roosevelt forces will recognize only 845 votes in the convention as the votes of actual and qualified delegates. If 423 delegates of these 845 unite on the choise of Root for temporary chairman the Roosevelt forces will abide the result. Otherwise not. If, however, Root is nominated only by the counting of the votes of these contested delegates, it is entirely likely that the bolt will take place immediately after
