COUNTY COURT ORDERS ARE ENTERED.

Contract For Improvement of South Main Street Awarded To Hillard & McGinnis.

Now this being the time appointed by the court for opening the bids submitted for the proposed South Main street-Parrot hill road improvement as re-advertised for by order of the court under date of June 13, 1912, which order was duly entered in the journal of this court on said date.

And two bids being submitted, C. S. Matthews bidding for grading complete including excavation, filling, surfacing and crowning roadbed (material unclassified) per cubic yard, at the unit price of 95 cents, and Hillard & McGinnis having also submitted a bid for the same item at the unit price of 48 cents per cubic yard and also submitted a bid for 12 in. corrugated iron pipe in place at \$2.90 per lineal foot.

And it appearing to the court that Hillard & McGinnis' bid is the lowest and best, bid received.

Therefore, it is ordered that the contract be awarded to Hillard & McGinnis, according to their bid.

Which contract is duly approved by the court upon the filing as approval of Hillard & McGinnis' bond in an amount of 50 per cent of the contract price as required in the plans and specifications of said proposed road improvements now on file in the office of county clerk of Douglas county, Oregon.

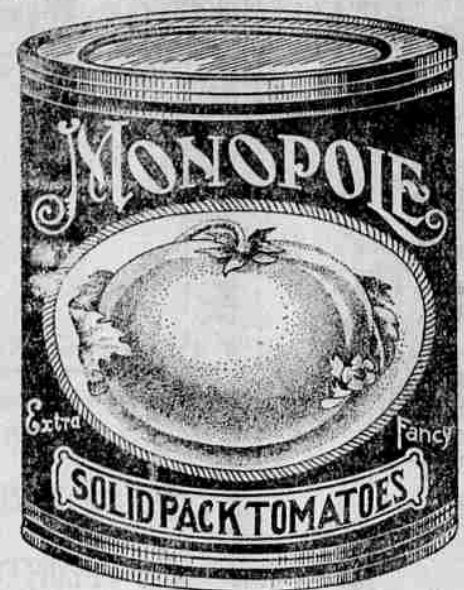
In the matter of deed from Fred P. Day to Douglas county for road in district No. 1, same is hereby accepted and ordered placed on record.

Two Striking Figures at The Baltimore Convention



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"EAST is east and west is west," but in spite of Kipling the twain do meet occasionally at American national conventions. The accompanying illustration presents an example. The dark man in light clothes at the left is Manuel L. Quezon, delegate from the Philippine Islands to the Democratic convention. The tall, rawboned veteran at the right is Colonel Bill Fairman of Pennsylvania, who was a delegate to the Baltimore convention, as he has been to conventions of his party for the last seventy years. Both of the delegates were objects of interest to their fellow delegates and to spectators—the one because of his age and the other by reason of his foreign appearance. The representation of the Philippines in the convention was due to an error in the call under which the delegates were summoned. Up to this convention "imperialism" has not been recognized to the extent of admitting Filipino delegates. Senator Quezon is a Nationalist and is resident commissioner in Washington for the islands.

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
