Street paving, building improvements in the business section, new homes in the residence district in course of construction, few if any desirable houses offered for rent, are a few of the indications that Roseburg is, as its people contend, the best town in Western Oregon. It is a safe place to invest. Properties are reasonable, and no bursted "booms" are hindering the progress of this city.

The sample of coal taken from the hills near Kellogg and exhibited by J. M. Engle, appear to be of the finest sort, and there is said to be unlimited quantities of the product. Men familiar with the coal mining industry have often asserted that great coal deposits exist in Douglas county, and only lack of transportation prevents development of many properties. The proposed railroads through the county to the coast will open up an immense section rich in mineral wealth and timber.

Seven thousand men and women paid admissions to Rose City Park racing course, Tuesday, at Portland, to see men jeopardize their lives in an auto race. The excitement was enhanced materially when a White steamer, driven by a Portland youth, jumped over the inner railing and down a thirty-foot embankment. The driver of the car was thrown fifty feet onto a pile of rock, where spectators found him with broken bones and crushed skull. Life is esteemed lightly these days, but the public must have amusement, and the griefs and heart-aches of relatives of victims are of little consequence.

Farm help appears to be scarce in this community. The advertising columns of The News almost daily contain advertisements of parties desiring good reliable help on the farm, both for the field and the farm-house. While there are some replies to these advertisements, generally the applicants are particular to inquire how far from town are the positions, and often turn down good opportunities. Then, too, the question of hours often plays an important part in the transaction. Too many men who need employment will stickle over the question of hours. Farmer folk are not in position to adhere to union regulations. Eight hours a day in the field would never plant the crops or harvest them. The farmer works hard himself and his help must give a reasonable service. The individual who seeks employment on the farm, sticks to his work, shows his ability for usefulness and performing a man's work at other places on the ranch than the dining table, will some day be operating a farm for himself. The other sort of man will continually hang around employment offices and always have a hard luck story to tell.
