THE American athletes, who proved the stellar attraction of the Olympic games in Stockholm, kept up their training aboard ship on the way over. An improvised track was marked out on one of the decks of the Finland, and the sprinters made good use of it. The figures shown in the picture, from left to right, Andrew Sockalexis, an Indian of Old Town, Me.; Lewis Tewanima of Carlisle Indian school and John Reynolds and Mike Ryan of the Irish-American Athletic club of New York, all participated in the twenty-five mile Marathon, the classic of the Olympic games. Sockalexis finished fourth and Tewanima seventeenth. Reynolds and Ryan found the heat and course too much for them and quit before the finish. The athlete shown doing a stunt in the ship's rigging is Jack Eller of New York, who contested in the hurdle events, but was unplaced.

YEARGER REPRODUCES FAMOUS CARTOON.

Presents Same To Joseph Bartholomay—"Dollar Mark" Hanna.

Joseph Bartholomay has in his possession an exact reproduction of Homer Davenport's first famous cartoon, "Dollar Mark Hanna", which was reproduced for him by S. Franklin Yeager, a newspaper cartoonist who was on the art staff of the New York Herald when Davenport first came East to New York from San Francisco and joined Hearst's New

York Journal. Marcus H. Hanna was the practical political friend of McKinley, and a powerful factor in his campaign for the presidency. Through his tremendous influence he gathered an immense fund for the financing of this campaign and at a salient point of the campaign the wit tipped pen of Davenport produced the cartoon "Dollar Mark Hanna". Hanna was shown backed up against a veritable cliff of gold bags wearing a checked suit, and in each one of the squares of the cloth on the coat, vest and trousers Davenport placed the sign of the dollar.

Mr. Yeager, who has been employed on some of the leading newspapers of the East considers this not only the strongest cartoon of a political nature ever drawn by the Oregonian cartoonist, but believes it to be above Gilliam's famous cartoon of James G. Blaine, of Maine, as the "Tattooed Man". This is readily conceded to be his first and strongest cartoon in the East and it not only won laurels for Homer Davenport, but shook the situation to its base and gave the sleepy cartoonists of the East their first intimation that the "Country Boy" from Silverton, Oregon, had come East with a bottle of the most caustic ink, a pen pointed sharper than a needle with native Western wit and a cynical eye which saw and easily comprehended men and things and the power to put his observations in pictorial black and white that acted like the lash end of a long black snake whip.

The cartoon of "Dollar Mark Hanna, through the courtesy of Mr. Bartholomay will be placed in Harth's Toggery window where all good Oregonians can see it.
