Start of the Recent Balloon Race From Kansas City, Mo.

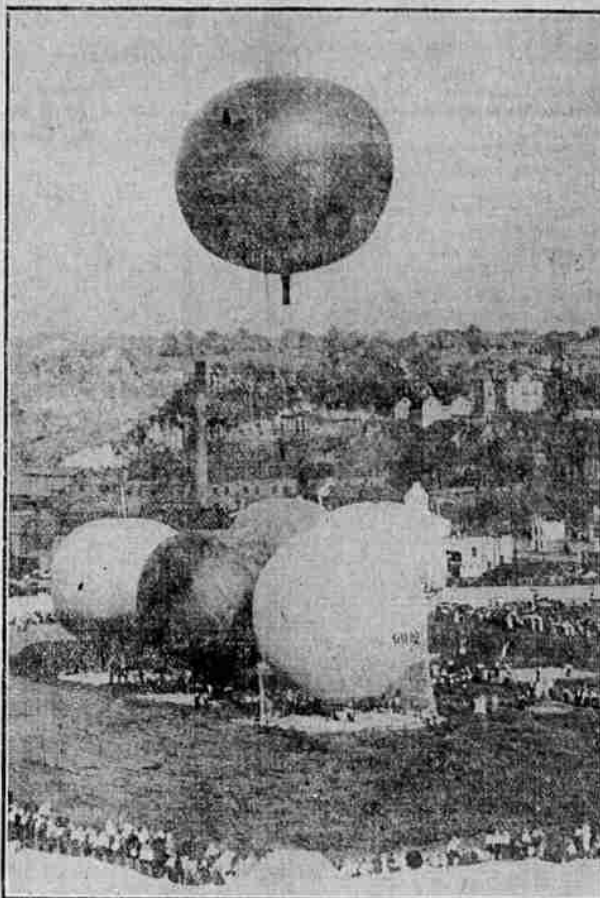

NO casualties attended the balloon race to determine the competitors in the international event which will be contested in Germany this fall. Seven balloons started from Kansas City, and the Uncle Sam descended at Manassas, Va., 925 miles distant, winning the race and beating the record of Lieutenant Lohm, made last year, by 445 miles. Its pilot was Captain H. E. Honeywell. Two other competitors, the Kansas City II and Drifter, will take part in the German race. The first, like the Uncle Sam, was the entry of the Kansas City Aero club; the Drifter carried the colors of the Cincinnati Aero club. The winning aeroplanist and his aid spent thirty-five hours in the air. Their voyage was shortened somewhat by the fact that a storm arose as they were approaching the Atlantic coast, which made a descent advisable.
