SLAP FOR TAFT

House Democrats and Insurgents Pass Wool Bill

OVER THE PRESIDENT'S VETO

Standpatters Bitterly Assail Clark—
Postal Clerks May Organize—
Cannot Affiliate With
Outside Bodies.

(Special to The Evening News.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—By reason of a ruling by Speaker Clark today the house passed the wool tariff revision bill over President Taft's veto by a vote of 174 to 80. Nineteen insurgent republicans voted with the democrats. On the vote as first announced by the speaker it appeared that the combined forces of democrats and insurgent republicans had failed to pass the bill by two votes. Ten members paired with absentees voted as present, and Clark ruled that since it took only two-thirds of the members voting aye or no to pass or reject a measure, and that two-thirds had in the present case voted aye, the bill was passed over Taft's veto. Standpat republicans bitterly assailed Speaker Clark on the ruling, and a violent dispute followed, but the speaker stood firm on the decision rendered.

Postal Clerks May Organize.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Following a red hot debate on the proposition of postal clerks having the right to unionize and strike, Senator Jones' amendment to the postoffice appropriation bill was defeated by a vote of 20 to 21. The amendment provided that organizations to which postal clerks may belong must not be affiliated with outside bodies. The senate voted on the proposition of the clerks being given a right to organize, passing the measure by a vote of 49 to 7, but postal clerks are barred from affiliating with any organization countenancing strikes or lockouts.

No Pop Ticket.
ST. LOUIS, Aug. 13.—The popular national convention met here today, but announcement was made that the party would not nominate a ticket. It is believed, however, that either Governor Wilson or Col. Roosevelt will be endorsed.

Postal Officials Indignant.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Officials of the postoffice department today denied the charges of Senator LaFollette in the senate yesterday, to the effect that letters from railway mail clerks, addressed to him had been opened and examined.
