More Secret Indictments Are Returned Today.

ROOSEVELT TALKS IN KANSAS

Sec. Knox Distinguished Guest At An Elaborate Banquet—Democratic Campaign Opened In Ohio Today—Wilson Talks.

(Special to The Evening News.) BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 21.—Several new secret indictments have been returned here by a special grand jury, in connection with accusations against the textile mill owners to the effect that they planted dynamite in strikers' homes during the Lawrence strike.

William M. Wood, president of the American Woolen Company; Frederick Atteaux, head of the Textile Mills Supply Company, and Daniel Collins, the famous dog fancier, were indicted in connection with the same alleged offenses.

Roosevelt in Kansas.

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Sept. 21.—Taking for his subject the social and industrial progress, and most particularly in the matter of the workingmen's compensation bill, Theodore Roosevelt today addressed big crowds in this city. He also spoke at Ottawa, Lawrence and Topeka. Roosevelt is hoarse and evidences fatigue as a result of his many speeches during the past few weeks.

TOKIO, Sept. 21.—Secretary of State P. C. Knox, of the United States, was the guest of honor at a banquet given here by Baron Shibusawa, a prominent Japanese economist. Secretary Knox, who attended the funeral of the late Emperor Mutsuhito as the special representative of the United States, called Saturday afternoon for San Francisco.

Are Sent to Bingham at Noon Today.

SERIOUS TROUBLE IS EXPECTED

B. B. Epping Says He Assisted In Planning The Murder Of His Father—Miners Are Busy Digging Potatoes.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Sept. 21.—Governor Spry today conferred with Adjutant General Edgerwood, Sheriff Sharp and several mine officials and decided not to call out the state troops except as a last resort. It is feared that their presence in the strikers' districts would cause additional trouble.

Twenty-five strikebreakers were today taken secretly into Bingham and all saloons are closed. A hundred more deputy sheriffs were sent to Bingham at noon. Although requested, the strikers refuse to surrender their arms and tension is increasing hourly. It is generally predicted here that a clash will come within the next forty-eight hours and it is feared that bloodshed will result. Like the strikers, the mine-owners are fully prepared for any emergency that may arise, and openly assert that they will protect their property at all hazards.

Assisted In Murder.

AMARILLO, Tex., Sept. 21.—B. B. Epping, 36 years old, and employed on the ranch of J. B. Sneed was arrested today following admissions that he assisted in Sneed's plans to kill Al B. Joyce, Jr., who had planned to elope with Mrs. Sneed. Epping made the above statement in a written communication to the district attorney. The grand jury convened at noon today to discuss Epping's confession.

Invitation Is Extended.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 21.—Formal invitation to hold its 1913 congress in New York and that of 1915 in San Francisco was presented to the Interparliamentary union in session here by the American delegates.

Are Digging Potatoes.

DAWSON, Y. T., Sept. 21.—Farmers in the Yukon territory from the Klondike down as far south as White Horse and Carcross are busy digging their potato crop. The Klondike district alone it is estimated will produce about 300 tons, which is valued at \$30,000.

GOVERNOR WEST

Will Ask Butte Falls Officials to Resign.

WOMEN PETITION THE GOVERNOR

Alleged That Butte Falls Officials Have Failed To Arrest Those Persons Suspected Of Violating Local Option.

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 21.—Apparently determined to continue his crusade throughout Oregon, it is rumored here today that Governor West has decided to demand the resignation of the city officials of Butte Falls, near here, for failure to enforce the prohibition statutes of that city. Only recently 150 women petitioned the governor to interfere and assist in stopping the illicit sale of liquor in Butte Falls. It is claimed that the officers have winked at the liquor violations in the past, and have made little, if any effort to arrest those suspected as being the violators.

It is also said that governor West will invade a number of other Southern Oregon towns during the next few weeks in hope of bringing violators of the local option laws to justice.
