### WOULD SAVE HIS PARTY FROM DISGRACE

New York Financier Contributed Small Sum of Nearly Half Million.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Thomas F. Ryan, the New York financier, was the first witness called this morning in the campaign fund investigation. He gave his occupation as a "farmer." Ryan testified that in 1904 he opposed the nomination of Parker and favored Gorham, of Maryland. After the nomination he said the adherents of Parker asked him to contribute to the campaign fund to the extent of \$50,000. Later he gave small amounts aggregating in all \$100,000. Toward the end of the campaign, Ryan said, he contributed \$300,000 to pay election debts. As a result of this giving every campaign debt was liquidated when the fight closed at election time. He contributed in this lavish manner because he did not want the party to disintegrate and be disgraced by a cloud of unpaid accounts. Ryan said that every dollar was from himself, and in no way represented corporation or business interests.

George W. Perkins, of New York, was the next witness. He said his occupation was that of "a retired working man." Said that at the present time he was working 18 hours a day to secure an eight hour law. He declared that he did not know how the republican campaign fund for 1904 was raised, but that he contributed between \$50,000 and \$75,000 to the total sum used.

◆ TAFT IS GAINING EVERYWHERE. ◆  
◆ Clubs Are Being Organized and The Republican Candidate Is Being Endorsed Generally— Will Carry Oregon. ◆

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 21.—Very little news, except cheerful news, comes into Taft headquarters. This is true of all parts of the state. The president is gaining everywhere. One worker in Portland, who went out among the railroad men, got one hundred of them to exchange little bronze bull mooses for red Taft buttons, and he did this in a single day. This is typical of things that are happening all over the state.

Hon. C. N. McArthur leaves Saturday night for a week's speaking tour in Grant and Wheeler counties. He will talk at Dayville, John Day, Canyon City, Prairie City, Fossil and Mitchell.

Walter L. Tooze, Jr., of Dallas, has just completed a very successful speaking trip through Columbia county. Although there are but one thousand men, women and children, in the city of St. Helena, he had an audience of one hundred and fifty persons on the evening of October 15. He addressed an enthusiastic audience at Clatskanie, Thursday, October 17.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, addressed an enthusiastic meeting at Heppner on the evening of Monday, October 14.

Hon. Wallace McCamant, of Portland, spoke to the people of Wheeler, Gilliam and Morrow counties, at their Tri-county fair at Condon on Thursday evening.

A rousing Taft Club has been organized at Tillamook, Oregon. Capt. W. D. Stillwell, who was a member of the first republican convention ever held in the state of Oregon, was chosen president of the club. An executive committee was selected, made up from every precinct in the county. As many of the republican committeemen in this committee are bull moosers, this executive committee chosen by the club will furnish a means of doing effective work in the county.

The republicans of Clatsop county are up and doing. A headquarters has been established under the direction of C. W. Halderman, county chairman, and J. S. Dellinger, state committeeman, and quantities of literature are being sent out from there to voters of this northwest county. The young men's Taft Club is thoroughly awake and giving active assistance to the state committee in the work in Clatsop county. Many of the leading young men of Astoria belong to this club and it did much good work for Taft in the primary campaign last spring. G. W. Warren is president and C. T. Crosby is secretary.
