Files Its Final Report.

The grand jury which convened at the court house Friday morning filed its final report late Saturday evening and was discharged from further duty. The final report was brief, and simply set out the fact that the jury was unable to investigate all the complaints brought to their attention on account of lack of time. Although in session but two days, the jury considered a large number of complaints and returned several indictments.

Mooney will appear in his own behalf, while District Attorney George M. Brown will have charge of the prosecution. The district attorney is of the opinion that Mooney will be convicted without difficulty.

LIFE NOT WORTH

Living Under Present Competitive System.

APPEAL TO REASON OWNER

Suicides At His Home In Girard—Freight Train Telescopes Passenger—Victims Mutilated Beyond Recognition.

GIRARD, Kans., Nov. 11.—"The struggle for life under the present competitive system is not worth while," was the way a note read found in the home of James Wayland, owner of the widely read socialist paper Appeal to Reason, who suicided today by firing a revolver into his mouth. The note was in Wayland's handwriting. The federal grand jury convened at Fort Scott to consider charges against Fred D. Warren, editor of the Appeal to Reason, but the fact that the latter told Wayland that an indictment would also be returned against him as owner of the publication, is not thought to have had any bearing in the matter. Friends of the deceased believe that the fact of his wife having been killed in an auto accident a year ago and over whose death Wayland brooded constantly, is the cause proceedings were brought by the district attorney upon request of Governor West, who says he desires to annul the charter of the institution. 19 Killed In Wreck.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 11.—Early this morning an excursion train on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad was run into by a freight near Montz, La., while the former was taking water at a siding, and many of the coaches were telescoped. The freight was running at 50 miles an hour, and the terrible impact drove the heavy engine through the passenger coaches, as though they were pasteboard. Thirteen passengers were killed and their bodies in several instances so terribly mutilated that it was impossible to tell whether they were black or white, or what sex the victims were. A misunderstanding of the trainmen's orders caused the accident. Six other of the injured died a few hours after the collision, making a total of 19 dead. About fifty were injured. Twenty more are reported fatally hurt.
