morning and entered a plea of guilty. Judge Hamilton sentenced the accused to an indeterminate term of from one to five years in the state penitentiary.

Verdict In Full.

After a deliberation of three hours the jury empaneled to listen to the evidence in the case of Jennie DeWald, executrix of the estate of Margaret Weaver, vs. O. H. Beyers, administrator of the estate of Jacob Brown, returned a verdict late last evening in which the plaintiff was awarded judgment in the sum of

\$425. The case was brought by Mrs. DeWald to recover \$425, alleged to be due on two promissory notes which it is claimed were executed by Brown in favor of Mrs. Weaver. The notes were found in a fruit can several months following the death of Mrs. Weaver. Brown had died previously, and consequently the burden of collecting the notes fell upon the executrix of the Weaver estate.
