**INQUEST IS HELD.**

his story of the discovery, Mr. Parker said he was loitering about the lobby of the hotel until nearly nine o'clock yesterday morning, awaiting Mr. Fields, who he was informed had arrived at the hostelry on the previous evening. Thinking that Mr. Fields had possibly overslept, Mr. Parker said he ascertained the number of the room occupied by Mr. Fields and later went up stairs for the purpose of summoning him to breakfast. "I rattled the door knob for a moment," said Mr. Parker, "and receiving no response I later opened the door which was unlocked. As I gazed in the direction of the bed my eyes met a sight which I shall never forget. There lay a man who I could not believe to be Mr. Fields. The form was covered with blood, while a nearby revolver told the story of the horrible tragedy. As my eyes fell on the prostrate form of my partner and companion, I quickly turned, and rushing down stairs notified attaches of the hotel of my discovery. A physician was summoned, and together with he and the day clerk, I returned to the death chamber. Ascertaining that the dead man was Fields, I gazed about the room and my eyes suddenly fell upon a note which was pinned on the mirror of

the bureau. I read this brief message and was surprised to find that it had been written by Fields and contained instructions to notify his brother, at Seattle, as well as myself. I have been associated with Mr. Fields for about a year and always found him to be a clean, honest and upright citizen. For the past two months, however, I noticed that he had been suffering from a mental depression, but never did I entertain the idea that his condition was such as to cause alarm."

Dr. A. C. Seely simply told of visiting the death chamber and of making a brief examination of the remains. "Fields was dead when I visited the room," said Dr. Seely, "a bullet wound of the right temple and a nearby revolver furnishing more evidence of the tragedy. I believe that the deceased died almost instantly, considering that the bullet penetrated the brain as well as other vital organs."

Charles Curry testified that he chatted with Fields following the latter's arrival in Roseburg Tuesday night, and that he appeared in the best of spirits at that time. In fact, Mr. Curry said he talked of his investments in Douglas county and appeared in a happy frame of mind.

Harry Mattroll, night clerk at the hotel, said Fields reached the hotel shortly after the arrival of train No. 14 late Tuesday evening, and after enjoying a brief chat with friends in the lobby, retired to his room on the second floor of the hotel. Mattroll said he noticed nothing peculiar in Field's conduct following his arrival at the hotel.

Eugene Parrott simply testified regarding business relations with Mr. Fields, and his partner, John W. Parker. Mr. Parrott said he regarded Mr. Fields as an exemplary citizen, and was most astonished when he heard of the supposed suicide.

Leonard Carpenter, a Medford, Ore., chardist, said he had been acquainted with Fields for ten years, and that he was cognizant with the fact that the latter had suffered from frequent spells of nervousness. These spells, Mr. Carpenter said, generally afflicted Fields in the fall of the year. Carpenter further testified that he was employed by Fields following the latter's arrival in Oregon and that their relations were most harmonious.

Mrs. DeMotta, a stenographer in the offices of District Attorney Brown, said she received a message from District Attorney Mulkey, of Medford, late last evening to the effect that Fields purchased a .38-calibre revolver from the Humphrey Hardware Company, of Medford, on November 16. This revolver was of the repeating army pattern and was paid for by Mr. Fields by check.

H. C. Fields, of Seattle, Wash., a brother of the deceased simply testified regarding his brother's age and history.

**Take Remains East.**

Henry C. Fields and wife, the former a brother of the deceased, arrived here from Seattle this morning and will leave for Milton, Mass., the native home of the Fields family with the remains tonight. The funeral will be held at that place. Inasmuch as Mr. Fields was much grieved over his brother's sudden demise, no effort was made to interview him today regarding the history of the supposed suicide.

**BROWN OBJECTS.**

of Oregon by its attorney, George M. Brown, prosecuting attorney, and objects to the county court setting aside the order of prohibition heretofore made under the terms of the local option liquor law, for the precinct of Glendale, and for grounds alleged:

That there was a pretended election under the terms of the local option liquor law held at the time of the general election in Glendale precinct, Douglas county, Oregon, on the 5th day of November, 1912, and the county clerk of Douglas county, Oregon, provided by law, taking to his assistance two justices of the peace of Douglas county, Oregon, has canvassed the vote of the said pretended local option liquor election had on the said 5th day of November, 1912, and has made an abstract of the votes for the information of the county court of said Douglas county, and from the abstract of said votes, made as aforesaid, it appears that at said local option liquor election in said Glendale precinct more votes were cast for prohibition than for against prohibition for the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes within said precinct, the exact number being as shown by said abstract of votes, ..... for prohibition; and ..... against prohibition.

That the petition praying for said election in said precinct, together with the certificate of the clerk, and in the order of the court, and the ballots submitting said question of prohibition to the voters of said precinct, as well as the tally sheets and the said abstract made by the said clerk and the two justices aforesaid, are hereby referred to and made a part of the record herein.

That said pretended local option liquor election is not lawful in this: That it was held at the time of a general election of the state of Oregon, and the said city of Glendale had not been made a voting precinct but said question was submitted to the voters of Glendale precinct which embraces much more territory and is inhabited by many legal voters who voted at the general election in said precinct.

That the record creating Glendale

precinct, together with the registration of the voters in Glendale precinct, is hereby referred to and made a part of this record.

That there are now indictments pending in the circuit court for Douglas county, Oregon, for the unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor, which sales were made within the corporate limits of the city of Glendale, and the setting aside of the order of prohibition heretofore made, would effect the prosecution of said cause.

That Glendale precinct was voted dry in an election heretofore held under the terms of the prohibition law when the county of Douglas was submitted as a whole, at which election the sale of intoxicating liquor was prohibited in said precinct under the terms of the local option

liquor law of the state of Oregon within the whole of said Douglas county, Oregon, after the qualified voters of said county and state had at an election, to-wit: an election held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1910, determined that the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes should be prohibited within Douglas county, Oregon, as a whole, and thereafter the county court of Douglas county, Oregon, declared the result of said election and made an order on the 26th day of November, 1910, absolutely prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes within the entire limits of said Douglas county.

That the prosecuting attorney is filing this formal objection for the reason that he believes that the is-

suance of a license to sell intoxicating liquors by the incorporated city of Glendale would be no defense to a criminal prosecution for the unlawful sale of intoxicating liquors, and criminal prosecutions would be multiplied.
