Other than the principal, plaintiff asks for a judgment equivalent to the costs incurred in bringing the action as well as interest at the rate of six per cent. Attorney Charles L. Hamilton represents the plaintiff.

The News was in error when it recently stated that the divorce suit of Mrs. M. C. Chesnut vs. T. A. Chesnut was settled and dismissed. On the contrary, there was no settlement of any nature between the parties involved. Attorney Charles L. In the circuit court late yesterday afternoon, Judge Hamilton authorized an injunction restraining the directors of school district No. 57, near Myrtle Creek, from issuing or selling bonds against the said school district for the purpose of erecting a new school house. Mr. Wiley brought the suit against the directors of the school district several weeks ago, and at the time claimed the board had no right to float bonds unless the same were legally authorized by the voters of the district. Mr. Wiley claimed that the directors had voted two taxes of three mills each during the past two years, and that the money realized from such a source was sufficient with which to erect a suitable school building. In fact, Mr. Wiley claims that the directors of the district sold a better school house for \$19 than the one it was contemplated to build at a cost of over \$800.
