CAUTAIN NAMED

Washington Boys Make Close Race
For Big Athletic Honor of Col-
lege Year.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COL-
LEGE, Corvallis, Ors., Dec. 12.—
"Hunky" Shaw of Aberdeen, Wash.,
for two years half on the O. A. C.
football team, has just been elected
captain of the gridiron squad for
next year, after a close race against
another Washington boy, Don Kellogg
of Hoquiam, who has played on the
team three years and is extremely
popular. Three ballots were taken
before a decision between these two
candidates could be made.

The sixteen men granted football
monograms, who elected the cap-
tain, are D. Kellogg, Hoquiam,
Wash.; T. E. May, Portland; Paul
Hofer, Salem; Robert Chrisman,
Danville, Ky.; O. Sitten, Carlton;
"Pruess" Moore, Harrisburg; Ben-
jamin Roberts, Portland; George
Dewey, Ashland; Charles Reynolds,
LaGrande; Ira Blackwell, Aber-
deen, Wash.; James Evenden, War-
renton; J. N. Shaw, Aberdeen, Wash.
W. S. Richardson, Salem; Gordon
Rasmussen, Marshfield; A. L. Lar-
sen, Astoria; L. M. McKenzie, Sum-
merville.

Those given service stripes to
wear on their arms are as follows:
for four years play on the first team,
Evenden, Reynolds and Sitten; three
years, Kellogg and May; two years,
Chrisman, Moore, Robertson, Shaw,
Richard and Rasmussen.

Two representatives of the col-
lege will go to Walla Walla, Wash.,
for the "Big Six" conference, at
which it will be voted as to whether
Haskell and Carlisle Indians shall
be ranked with other college ath-
letes. The two schools are of an
academy grade, but athletically
equal to other colleges, and it is
believed that men who have played
on their teams should be on the
same footing as those who have
played elsewhere. The question of
barring men from college amateur
athletics for playing professional
baseball to make college expenses,
in summer, will also come up for
discussion.

FORMER ROSEBURG MAN
CITED FOR CONTEMPT

"Story" Sheridan, Formerly of Rose-
burg, Criticizes Idaho Supreme
Court.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 11.—Readers
of the Capital-News, the afternoon
newspaper here, did not see the text
of Colonel Roosevelt's remarks at
Chicago yesterday concerning the
action of the Idaho Supreme Court
in citing the Capital-News for con-
tempt of court. A full report of the
Colonel's speech, denouncing the
court, was in the office of the news-
paper, but only the introduction was
printed with this addition:

"The Associated Press report of
Colonel Roosevelt's speech at this
point contained his further reference
to the above decision and the fact
his message to the people of Idaho
was published in the Capital-News
of Boise and the publisher and edi-
tor were cited for contempt. The
report was submitted to the attorneys
for the Capital-News and acting upon
their advice that its publication in
Idaho would be a further and addi-
tional contempt punishable by the
Supreme Court of this state as they
construed the law as laid down by
that court and acting upon their in-
struction the balance of the speech
is herewith suppressed."

The morning paper today printed
the full report of Colonel Roosevelt's
speech.

R. S. Sheridan, editor of the
Boise Capital-News, who has been
cited for contempt by the Idaho Su-
preme Court for commenting on the
decision of the bench which prevent-
ed the Bull Moose Presidential Elec-
tors from being printed on the bal-
lot, is a former Oregonian. In his
review of the Idaho situation in Chi-
cago yesterday, Colonel Roosevelt
commended the stand of Editor
Sheridan and urged the Progressives
to stand with the newspaper man.
Mr. Sheridan was a well-known
newspaper man in Southern Oregon,
before going to Boise, about 12
