Premium Awards Completed By the Judges Thursday Evening.

With all the premiums awarded, poultry fanciers yesterday took advantage of their last opportunity to view the many birds on exhibit at the Armory, under the auspices of the Douglas County Poultry Association.

While the show has been a great

success from the standpoint of exhibits, the attendance has not been as large as anticipated by those in charge. This can be partly explained, however, when it is realized that Christmas is near at hand and most of the farmers as well as townspeople are unusually busy.

Nevertheless the show will be repeated next year, when even greater efforts will be made to interest the public in the future of the poultry industry in Douglas county.

**For the Children**

A Merry Christmas Morn After Santa Claus' Visit.

Santa Claus has been very liberal with the little girl in the picture. When she went to bed on Christmas eve she prepared for the good old fellow by hanging several stockings on the foot of the bed. Santa was equal to the occasion, however, and filled them all from toe to top. Perhaps he had to forget some other little girl; but, sad though it be, that sometimes happens. This fortunate baby is yet too young to think of anything more than that dolls and other toys and candy galore are her gifts from Santa Claus. Maybe when she grows older thoughts of others less happy will temper her joy and the pleasure of giving be made known to her.

**The Old Home of the Doll.**  
The old home of the doll is Thüringia, especially the town of Sonneberg, twelve miles from Coburg. Most of the poorer families in and around Sonneberg are engaged in this industry, which is the chief source of revenue of the population, giving employment for the whole year. The work demands a great deal of practice and skill, as well as time and trouble. The inhabitants start making dolls while very young and by constant practice are finally able to work with astonishing accuracy and speed. In the doll industry only some special part of the dolls is made by each person. Some make the bodies, others the heads and still others the arms, hands, etc. By this division the work is done much quicker and better.

The assembling of the different parts of the dolls is often very complicated. The best jointed dolls have stout elastic cord on the inside, to which the movable parts are attached. A special branch of the industry is devoted to the making of dresses and hats. The latest Parisian styles are copied in dressing the larger sized dolls, and the creations turned out compare very favorably, in miniature, with the original.

**Christmas Decorations.**  
Have the children gather evergreen and make long strings of it to reach from the gaslights over table to each window and door frame. Put a large red bow of ribbon on one corner of tablecloth, set a tiny spray of holly at each plate and one in the center of plum pudding. One can get a tiny pine tree, set in center of table and run red and green baby ribbon to each side and corner of table, ending with spray of holly. Green and red crepe paper can be used in place of evergreen, where it cannot be obtained. Hang a large bell on the light over the table and little ones at each window.

**Make Father a Spectacle Wiper.**  
Cut two rounded pieces of chambray two or three inches across. Bind them with bright colored ribbon and fasten the two pieces together with a bow of the same ribbon. The edges may be scalloped, if preferred. Print across the top with pen and ink, "I make all things clear."

Mrs. J. S. Northrop, of Lebanon, won the Harding Land Co. cup for the highest scoring pen at the show. Mrs. E. L. Farrens, of Edenhower, won the beautiful silver trophy shield donated by Himes & Oliver for the highest scoring hen. E. J. McClanahan, of Eugene, won the association's Brown Leghorn cup. E. E. Hardesty, of Eugene, won the association cup for Rhode Island Reds. A. E. Kruse was awarded the incubator donated by E. J. McClanahan, of Eugene, for the best and largest display. C. W. Bradford won the White Wyandotte association cup, while Franklin Barker was the lucky winner of the association's Silver Laced Wyandotte cup. The Casa Granda Poultry Co., of this city, has the pleasure of taking home the handsome challenge cup offered by themselves for any one having a higher scoring pen of Crystal White Orpingtons.

In addition to the above awards, a modern sanitary drinking fountain was awarded to each of the high school boys who exhibited at the show, they being Ernest Barnum, Earl Burr, Fred Patterson and Johnnie Young.
