From Portsmouth to the United States

WITH REMAINS OF AMBASSADOR

Thousands View Cortège Which Was Entrained at 10:35 o'Clock This Morning—Flags Are Placed at Half Mast

LONDON, Eng., Dec. 21.—The cruiser, Natal, carrying the remains of the late Ambassador Reid, left Portsmouth at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon for New York.

All British and American flags were placed at half mast, while the passing warships shot salutes. The casket containing the remains of the late Ambassador was removed from Dorchester House at 10 o'clock this morning and conveyed to Victoria station. "Thousands viewed the cortège, and all stood with bared heads. The cortège was entrained at 10:45 o'clock, and arrived at Portsmouth two hours later.

Man Attempts Suicide.
SEATTLE, Dec. 21.—Crazed by grief over the death of his wife, killed by a Great Northern engine while she was fishing on a trestle here, Harry Rogers after twice attempting to commit suicide, was locked in the city jail. He attempted to throw him-

self off the trestle where his wife met death and after being rescued, tried to throw himself under a moving engine.

Clerk Seeks Divorce.
PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—Because he objected to having his wife invite husky male friends to come to their home and bounce chairs off on his head, H. R. Griebel, clerk, is today seeking a divorce. Griebel claims further that his militant spouse delighted in blacking his eyes occasionally.

Burglar Loses Overcoat.
SEATTLE, Dec. 21.—A burglar entering the home of Ben J. Wiggins not only failed to secure nothing but lost his overcoat, coat, shoes vest and an electric torch. He was looking the place over guided by the terrorized Mrs. Wiggins when Wiggins himself appeared. Despite the fact that he nearly stripped the night agent to the buff in the encounter following, the fellow managed to slip away.

Aged Indian Dies.
BAY CITY, Ore., Dec. 21.—Mrs. Maggie Adams, 115 years old, Clatsop Indian and chief's squaw, is dead here today. It is claimed she was the oldest woman in the state. Three daughters survive.

Three Trustees Escape.
SALEM, Dec. 21.—Taking advantage of liberties afforded them, three trustees have escaped from the state insane hospital here. One of the men, Milton Taylor was recaptured later but George White and Thomas Homer are still at large. It is feared

NEW COMPLAINT

Filed Against Brewery by the District Attorney.

BROWN ALLEGES NEW MATTER

New Complaint Charges Brewery With Selling 700 Barrels of Salem Beer During the Year 1911 —Also Astoria Beer.

Declaring that during the year 1911 the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company purchased more than barrels of beer from the Salem Brewing Company, of Salem, Ore., and that the same was shipped to Roseburg and sold by the local brewery, contrary to the provisions of the local option liquor laws, District Attorney George M. Brown this morning filed a complaint against the brewery in lieu of the one filed against the corporation at the time the quo-warranto proceedings were instituted and which was late yesterday dismissed by Judge Harris upon request of the district attorney.

In addition to purchasing 700 barrels of beer from the Salem Brewing Company, District Attorney Brown alleges in the complaint filed today that the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company also bought a large amount of beer from the Northern

Pacific Brewing Company, of Astoria.

The latter consignments of beer, the district attorney asserts, were shipped to Roseburg and sold by the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company contrary to the local option laws. Believing that the local brewery had purchased large quantities of beer from outside breweries in the year 1911 and being desirous of introducing this evidence during the trial of the quo-warranto proceedings, the district attorney thought it best to dismiss the former action and start over with a new complaint founded upon the new matter brought to light.

This gave the district attorney an opening and he asked permission to file a second complaint against the brewery.

This request was granted by Judge Harris, who signed the following order:

"Now at this time comes on to be heard the application of George M. Brown, as Prosecuting Attorney in and for the Third Prosecuting Attorney's District of the State of Oregon, which application asks the Court for leave to maintain an action at law in the name of the State of Oregon upon the information of said Prosecuting Attorney, for the purpose of avoiding the charter and annulling the existence of the above named defendant corporation, the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company, which application is based upon an affidavit filed by said Prosecuting Attorney setting forth that the said Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company is a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Oregon, and is now a corporation doing business in Douglas County, Oregon, and the enterprise, business, pursuit and purposes in which said corporation is engaged is, among other things, in the business, enterprise, and pursuit of conducting a general brewing establishment and carrying on the manufacture of beer as a beverage and selling the same at wholesale and retail compensation in Douglas County, Oregon; and

"That at a legal election held by the qualified voters of Douglas County, Oregon, on the first day of June, 1908, which election was held in accordance with the Local Option Liquor Law of the said State of Oregon, the said legal voters determined that the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes should be prohibited within Douglas County, Oregon, as a whole, and after the County Court for Douglas County, Oregon, had declared the result of said election and made an order absolutely prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes within the entire limits of said Douglas County.

"That thereafter at the general election held in the County of Douglas, State of Oregon, on the eighth day of November 1910, the question whether there should be prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes within said County as a whole, was submitted to the legal voters of said County, and then and there determined by a majority of the votes cast thereon in the County as a whole for prohibition. That thereafter, on the 26th day of November, 1910, the County Court of said County made an order declaring the result of said vote, and an order absolutely prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, in the whole of said County. And said orders ever since have been and still are in full force and effect in the whole of said County.

"That said affidavit sets forth that the defendant corporation had purchased large quantities of beer without Douglas County, Oregon, during the year 1911, and had sold the same in Douglas County, Oregon, contrary to the terms of the Local Option Liquor Law;

"That said affidavit further alleges that said corporation has within Douglas County, Oregon, during the year 1912, adulterated real beer and had made a product called 'near-beer' and sold the same within Douglas County, Oregon;

"That said affidavit further sets forth that the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company had sold beer during the years 1912 and 1911 in Douglas County, Oregon, contrary to the terms of the Local Option Liquor Law.

"That said affidavit is accompanied by the Judgment Roll showing the conviction of the above named defendant together with its directors of

the crime of Unlawfully Selling Intoxicating Liquor within Douglas County, Oregon, contrary to the terms of the Local Option Liquor Law.

"WHEREFORE it is Ordered that leave be granted to the said Prosecuting Attorney to file an information and maintain an action at law in the name of the State of Oregon for the purpose of avoiding the charter and annulling the existence of the Roseburg Brewing & Ice Company."

"Dated at Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, this 21st day of December, 1912."

Through his ability to institute new proceedings against the brewery District Attorney Brown says he has a much stronger case than at the time the original complaint was filed. In fact, he says the original complaint made no reference to the practice of the brewery in purchasing beer from outside breweries and shipping the same to Roseburg for disposition. This evidence, alone, the district attorney contends should be sufficient to show that the brewery has violated the provisions of its charter.

The more important sections of the complaint filed against the brewery by the district attorney today follows:

"That for a second further and separate cause of action the said George M. Brown, as Prosecuting Attorney for the Third Prosecuting Attorney's District of the state of Oregon, who brings this action for and in behalf of the State of Oregon, comes into court, and in the name and by the authority thereof, gives the court to understand and informed that the Roseburg Brewing

STRUCK BY TRAIN.

Myrtle Creek, Ore., Dec. 21.—Robert Weaver, formerly a resident of Texas but of the past year a resident of this vicinity, was struck by an S. P. train at a point about two miles west of Myrtle Creek shortly before noon today. Other than sustaining a broken arm and other outward injuries, Weaver is believed to be suffering internally. According to the engineer of the train, Weaver was first detected walking on the track quite a distance ahead of the approaching train. The bell was ringing, and as the engineer blew the whistle Weaver stepped from the track, but not in time to clear the engine which struck him with sufficient force to throw his body up the bank a distance of thirty feet. The train was stopped and the injured man was taken to Myrtle Creek where he was turned over to a Southern Pacific physician. Mr. Weaver is 59 years of age, and according to the physician will probably succumb to his injuries. He is a brother of Edward and Ike Weaver, both well known residents of Myrtle Creek.
