NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That a General Election will be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on Monday, October 6th, 1915, between the hours of 9 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M. of said day (provided that the judges shall have the power to adjourn for one hour at noon) at which said election the following officers will be elected, to-wit:

One Mayor to serve for two years.
One City Recorder to serve for two years.

One Treasurer to serve for two years.

One Councilman from each of the four wards of the City, each to serve for two years.

One Councilman from Ward No. 1 to serve for one year.

Said election will be held at the following named polling places, and conducted by the following named Judges and Clerks, or their duly selected substitutes, to-wit:

First Ward—Polling Place, Court House; Judges, Wm. Carstens, F. W. Dillar, T. E. Rafferty; Clerks, Belle Good, Emma P. Cardwell.

Second Ward—Polling Place, Uppena hotel; Judges, A. A. Bollova, M. Jean, Burt, E. E. Carter; Clerks, C. C. Brown, Abel Van Buren.

Third Ward—Polling Place, Roseburg hotel; Judges, J. J. McKay, Rita K. Cobb, A. S. Baell; Clerk, Edna Warton; Stenographer, J. C. Gubers.

Fourth Ward—Polling Place, City Hall; Judges, C. C. Gies, B. B. Hammond, G. V. Wimbley; Clerk, Adde Josephson; Stenographer, C. E. Egan.

Notice is further given that a referendum election No. 515, entitled "An Ordinance licensing, taxing and regulating business occupations, professions, callings, trades and employments within the corporate limits of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and regulating the manner of issuing licenses, and providing a punishment for the violation of a provision of this ordinance, and repealing ordinance No. 213, passed by the Common Council on the 15th day of June, 1910, and all ordinances amendatory thereto or in conflict herewith, and declaring an emergency," passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Roseburg on the 23rd day of December, 1912, upon which the referendum has been invoked, will be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of said City for their approval or rejection. The form in which said referendum will be submitted on the official ballot is as follows, to-wit: "Resolved by Referendum, Ordinance No. 515, to license, tax and regulate certain occupations, etc., providing a penalty, repealing Ordinance Number 213, and declaring an emergency."

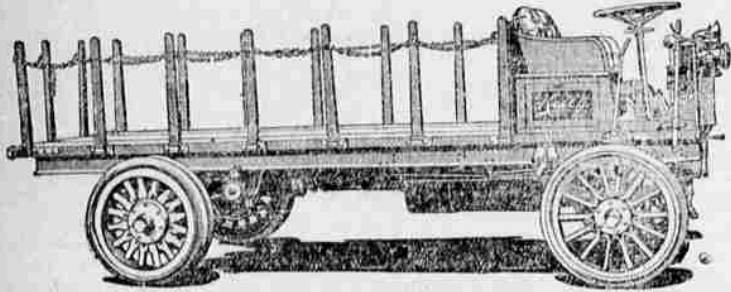
