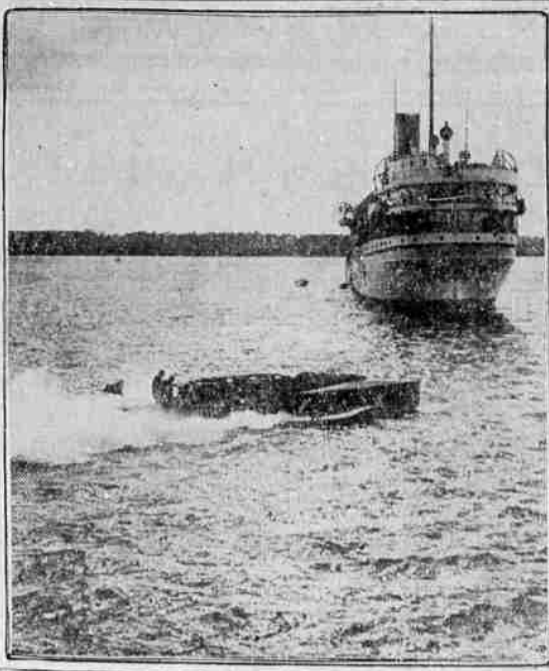


**BRITISH MOTOR BOAT WINNER OF INTERNATIONAL RACES.**

The speedy British motor boat Maple Leaf IV, which won the recent international motor boat races in England, defeating American and French contenders for the Harmsworth Cup.

This type of boat has completely revolutionized the building of high speed boats. The bottom has the appearance of an inverted stair-case, which, when standing, settles into

the water. As the boat gradually attains speed she rises out of the water, her planes gliding along the surface of the water until, when at top speed, she literally skips in leaps and bounds; in this way overcoming the resistance formerly caused by plowing through the water.

Not many years ago ten or fifteen miles an hour was considered fast for a motor boat, but now this type of boat has attained a speed equal to that of a railway train.
