County Commissioner Jefferson Wiley, of Myrtle Creek, arrived here yesterday afternoon and will leave tomorrow for points in the northern part of the country for a tour of inspection of the roads. Pass Creek canyon will be visited, as well as other points where the roads are in need of improvement.

Detected while in the act of attempting to dispose of several knives taken from the store of Harry Pearce, a stranger giving his name as Nolo Butcher, was arrested late Wednesday by Marshal Fenton and remanded to the city jail. He was later turned over to the county officials to answer to the charge of petty larceny. When arraigned before Justice Masters this morning he entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to a term of 25 days in the county jail. Butcher was loitering about the store of Mr. Pearce Wednesday afternoon under the pretense of waiting for a farmer who had arranged to meet him there. While Mr. Pearce was standing in front of his store talking to friends, Butcher opened the show case and appropriated three knives of considerable value. Leaving the store Butcher went to the Smith livery barn where he succeeded in selling one of the knives to Gus McCulloch. Another knife he attempted to sell to Mr. Smith. Noticing that Mr. Pearce's name was stamped on

the blade of the knives, Mr. Smith called up Mr. Pearce by telephone and informed him of the incident. Mr. Pearce then went to the livery barn, and peculiarly the thief attempted to sell him one of the knives. Mr. Pearce recognized Butcher as the fellow who was seen loitering about his store and notified the officers. His arrest followed. Butcher is a middle-aged man, and claims to have come to Roseburg in search of work.

The J. Frank Company, of San Francisco, has filed a suit in the justice court against W. S. Howard. The plaintiffs seek to recover the sum of \$154.31, alleged to be due for material furnished the defendant by the plaintiffs. Attorney A. N. Greut represents the complaining company.

Simon Caro, the merchant, will remove to his new business store in the Umpqua hotel building, about October first. In the meantime his great removal sale is still going on as advertised recently.
