J. B. Corson, of Champagne, Ill., arrived here last evening to spend a few days looking over the country.

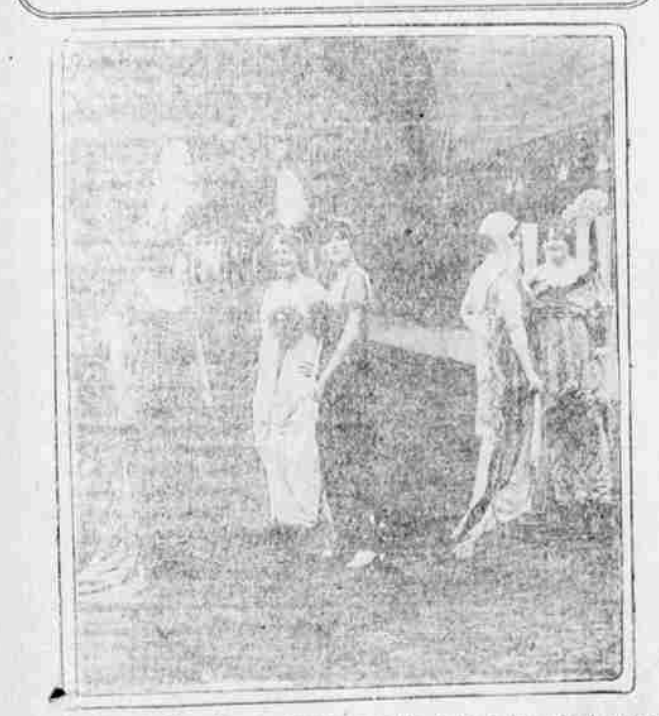
George D. Hazlett, of Myrtle Creek, spent the past few days in Roseburg attending to business matters. He returned to his home today.
