HANSEL SWOONS WHEN SENTENCED TO BE HANGED

ASTORIA, Or., Sept. 29.—Oswald C. Hansel, convicted Saturday of the murder of the late Judge Taylor, was this morning sentenced by Judge Campbell to hang by the neck until dead at the state penitentiary at Salem Friday, November 14. Hansel collapsed completely when sentence was pronounced, and fell from the chair in which he was sitting. He was carried from the court room, placed in an automobile and taken back to jail.

The crime for which Hansel was sentenced was committed on September 14, when he shot and instantly killed Judge Taylor at the S. P. & S. depot in this city.
