**TELEGRAPH BRIEFS.**

Interesting Items Gathered By Press Association.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 6.—Pressing here today at the opening of the State Press Association convention, State Printer F. W. Richardson, president of the order, invited all editors to San Francisco during the 1915 exposition. Plans for the gathering were discussed in detail by the state editors today. The meeting will continue tomorrow.

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 6.—Whether certain railroads of Colorado give free transportation, either state or interstate, to influence shippers is the point on which the debating trials of the railroads and shippers which opened here today will decide. The government expects to prove that the Denver & Rio Grande and Colorado & Southern railroads regulated the issue of their passes so that large shippers were favored in this respect. The Portland Cement Company and the Victor American Fuel Company in the same cases are charged with having accepted rebates and favors of this nature. The government's witnesses will be employees of the companies involved.

The trials are the result of an inquiry by the Interstate Commerce Commission into the abuse of passes given by Colorado railroads last spring. It was shown then that hundreds of free tickets were given to shippers and that politicians openly solicited passes. Some judges, including some from the state supreme bench, were alleged to have requested or accepted such favors.

PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., Oct. 6.—One hundred and fifty members of the Nebraska National Guard came here today to participate in the annual rifle practice to be held on the government range for six days. Adjutant General P. L. Hall was in command. Two men from each company were ready to compete for final honors in marksmanship. Each of the teams of expert riflemen, representing the two regiments of national guardsmen in this state, expected to draw down high honor scores and incidentally the trophy to be awarded the team showing the highest proficiency.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Police Inspector John F. Dwyer and four members of his police squad which conducted the now famous 1 a. m. looting raids on Henly's restaurant following the late Mayor Gaynor's order of closing despite a ruling by a police magistrate that it couldn't be enforced, today went to trial on charges of assault. Inspector Dwyer and his four policemen were held for trial by the grand jury.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Better salaries and shorter hours in hospitals for nurses were demanded today by workers at the opening session of the annual convention of the Guild of St. Barnabas for nurses. The convention closes tomorrow.
