## INHUMAN FIEND

**Gloats Over Murder of Women He Has Committed.**

**CONFESSES FOURTEEN CRIMES**

Relates Details of His Murders to Police—Believed the Man Is Guilty of Other Butcheries.

**CHICAGO, Oct. 6.**—"Women, damn 'em, I hate 'em, and I killed 'em just like one would swat a fly. This was the remarkable statement made to officers by Henry Sporer, who, according to his own confession, not only killed Mrs. Mildred Rextroat, a teacher of dancing, who he shot to death at Wayne, last week, but he has slain thirteen other victims in the last fourteen years. Sporer slept breakfast this morning was questioned by Chief of Police McWeeny and Assistant States Attorney Sullivan. In the confession today Sporer reiterated all the horrible details of the fourteen murders that he says he has committed, and during the entire recital evidence of signs of remorse, but rather gloated over the fact that the murdered victims were women. Chief McWeeny believes that the least four other murders are at Spenser is responsible for which were not mentioned in his confession.
