WARREN REED AND J. O. WATSON AT MARSHFIELD.

Mr. Reed Tells of Many Improvements About Gardiner.

Warren P. Reed, of Reedsport, is in Marshfield, coming to meet J. O. Watson, of Roseburg, concerning legal matters. They will go to Gardiner today.

Mr. Reed reports great activity and much progress in the railroad work. About 100 men are now employed on the Smith River tunnel, north of the Umpqua, and rapid progress is being made south of the Umpqua.

The Gardiner Mill Company expects to shut down tonight for a month or six weeks, during which they will overhaul the boilers, put in new concrete foundations and make other improvements. They have been running steadily for about two years and cut about 100,000 feet per day.

Mr. Reed has a force of men at work at Clear Lake, making arrangements to pipe water from there to the town, a distance of four and one-half miles.

things in shape to submit a bond issue proposition to the voters to build a jetty to improve the bar.

Owing to the poor lumber market, the plans of the St. Paul Lumber Company to put in a big mill there are in abeyance.
