In almost every instance the business men of Roseburg expressed themselves as displeased with the attempt to belittle Oregon's educational institutions by reducing the appropriations authorized at the last session of the state legislature. In fact, Roseburg and Douglas county can be depended upon to give a substantial majority against the referendum of the measure.

C. A. Stevens, against whom his wife recently filed a suit for divorce, today filed a cross-complaint in the circuit court. Mr. Stevens admits that he married his wife, Eleanora Stevens, at Oakland, on April 26, 1913, and that one child was born to their union. He denies all other allegations contained in the complaint. In his cross-complaint Mr. Stevens alleges cruel and inhuman treatment at the hands of his wife, the utterance of vile language, and the neglect of her household duties. Mr. Stevens says his wife repeatedly threatened to take his life, and would have probably made good her promise had it not been for the interference of friends. Mr. Stevens also charges his wife with attending public dances, without the least regard for her child or husband. Mr. Stevens asks for a decree, the custody of the minor child and such other relief as the court may deem expedient. Mr. Stevens is one of Oakland's best known residents, having been engaged in the lumber business there for years. In an item published in yesterday's issue of The News it was stated that Mrs. Stevens filed the cross-complaint. This was incorrect. Instead, Mr. Stevens filed the cross-complaint. 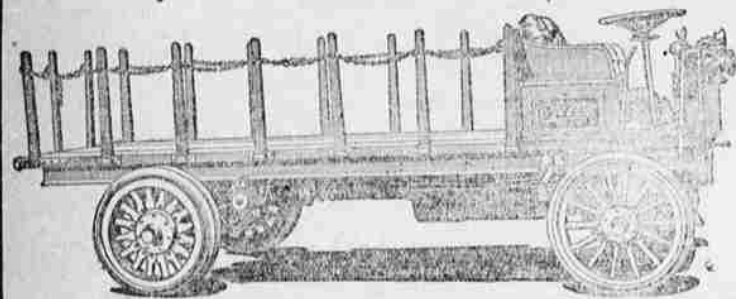
