The case of forgery, recently filed against George Douglas, a local real estate agent, was dismissed by Justice of the Peace Marsters this morning. Douglas paid Mr. Jarvis \$20, which was the amount of the check, together with the costs of the arrest which amounted to something over \$75. Mr. Douglas explained in court this morning that he intended no wrong at the time he presented the check to Mr. Jarvis, presuming that he had ample funds in the bank to meet the claim. Inasmuch as Mr. Douglas signed his own name to the check, the evidence failed to substantiate a charge of forgery as set out in the complaint on which the accused was arrested.

Edward Noah, a local blacksmith, was arrested by Sheriff George Quine shortly after 11 o'clock this morning on a warrant issued at the instigation of the defendant's wife, Mrs. Maggie Noah. Mrs. Noah charged her husband with calling her a number of vile names as well as having struck her a severe blow in the face. The fracas is alleged to have occurred at the family home, in North Roseburg, yesterday morning. When brought into court Mr. Noah denied the accusations of his wife, and in explanation said she was to blame for the trouble. Mr. Noah said his little son had complained of insufficient lunch at noon, and to remedy the situation he (Mr. Noah) informed his wife that she should have sufficient food for the last upon his return from school at noon. Mr. Noah says this angered his wife and she became hostile. In fact, he claimed that she threw a number of articles at him, including knives, forks and other objects. A fork struck him on the forehead, he claims, with the result that he sustained a painful bruise. Mr. Noah was positive that he did nothing to incite the trouble. Mrs. Noah, on the contrary, contended that Noah possesses a mean disposition and frequently gives a beating to his wife. On the particular occasion set out in the complaint, Mrs. Noah said her husband struck her a severe blow in the face, with the result that she was wounded. She also contends that Mr. Noah threatened to leave her. Mrs. Noah further stated that her husband called her a number of vile names which she disliked. Both Mr. and Mrs. Noah have children by former marriages and it is believed the trouble resulted over the offspring. The case will be heard by Justice Marsters late this afternoon, when both parties involved will be given an opportunity to tell their respective tales.
