PITIAL AT NOON TODAY Mrs. Nancy Jane Welker Succumbs After Illness Lasting Several Weeks. Mrs. Nancy Jane Welker, aged 75 years, and for more than half a century a resident of Douglas county, died at Mercy hospital shortly after noon today. Death was due to a complication of diseases. Mrs. Welker was born in the State of Tennessee, and came to Douglas county in the year 1854. Her husband died here about 20 years ago. Mrs. Welker was the mother of 12 children, all of whom have passed away with the exception of Ora, who is a well known resident of this city. The deceased is survived by three brothers, John and William Tipton, of Roseburg, and Fred Tipton, of Harney county. She also leaves a grandson, Willie Smith, of Roseburg, and two granddaughters, Mrs. Ella Dunham, and Mrs. Etta Shaffer, both of whom reside in Washington. Arrangements for the funeral will not be completed until late this evening. Mrs. Welker was one of Douglas county's most highly esteemed women, and her death is deplored by a large concourse of friends and acquaintances.
