MARY COOK WINS IN LONG LEGAL BATTLE IN LAND DEPARTMENT

Is Declared Owner of Certain Homestead Situated in Douglas County.

An opinion was received here today by Attorney Eddy from the secretary of the interior, in which Mary Cook is declared the owner of a certain homestead situated in Douglas county.

Mrs. Cook took up the land under the homestead act, and according to the evidence went ahead and made the usual improvements. Later A. H. Howard contested Mrs. Cook's right to the claim on the grounds that the land was more valuable for mineral than for its timber.

The local United States land office decided in favor of Mrs. Cook, as did the commissioner of the general land office and the secretary of the interior. Attorney B. L. Eddy represented Mrs. Cook.
