The Roseburg Nursery Co. finished unloading their first full carload of this season's business late yesterday. The shipment came from Hood River and is particularly fine looking stock. Mr. Black states that the trees propagated in the Hood River district are probably the finest in the world. Every action used is selected from the very best bearing trees of a valley that furnishes fruit to the highest priced trade of the country. In that way the stock is bred up to a higher state of perfection each year. This means more and better fruit and more thrifty growing trees. When the young trees are ready to be delivered to the planter they are inspected (not while they are standing in the row) but after they are taken from the ground. The inspector takes up each tree separately and each as are not up to standard are broken in two and thrown on the trash heap. The people of Southern Oregon are probably much more indebted to the Roseburg Nursery Co. than they know for the care the firm exercises in selecting trees and also shrubbery and small fruits that are furnished them. Their business has made gratifying gains each year, until they have reached a scale where they are able to fill any sized order on short notice.
