At the regular meeting of the stockholders of the Roseburg Stamp Company, held at the commercial club rooms last evening, it was decided to discontinue the premium parlors in the Bradley building, on Jackson street. This action was taken by the merchants on account of the fact that most of the stamp holders exchange them for merchandise at the stores. The first annual reports, covering the months of November and December were read and approved. These reports showed the company to be in excellent financial condition. Other than having sufficient money with which to redeem all the outstanding stamps the company has a surplus in the treasury. It was decided to continue giving trading stamps to all purchasers indefinitely. Upon a close check the officers of the company found that stamps aggregating purchases of \$5,000 were missing. These stamps aggregate a cash value, when exchanged for merchandise, of about \$150. The stamps were checked over with a view of determining the number that were taken from the premium parlors during the past few weeks. Whether the person or persons who exchanged these stamps

will be prosecuted will not be determined for a few days.
