THE FORD WAGES

Probably the most notable of all the wage sharing propositions that have been put into operation in this or any other country, is that made by the Ford Motor Company of Detroit, in which the vast sum of \$10,000,000 yearly is divided among its army of 26,000 employees. It is stated also that Mr. Ford should have said, that no one in the employ of the company should get less than five dollars per day, and this applied to office boy and floor scrubber as well as mechanics. This act is variously extolled and condemned, as the viewpoint is taken. The first impulse is to commend the act without any reserve, but other factors are to be considered. The Toledo (O.) News-Bee asks, "whether by heavily increasing the wages of his own employees, will Ford disorganize the entire automobile industry, crowd those who have small margins to the wall, and ultimately throw into idleness more workers than the number of those he will directly benefit? Again if the profit of the Ford company is so tremendous that he can thus ignore the standard of wages in the industry at large, should Ford, the Ford stockholders and the Ford workers get it all, or should the consumers get their share? These questions show how intricate is the problem of modern industry on the competitive basis, and how difficult it is to find the wise social solution while preserving the private profit motive." If the division of the profits of this vast business are really to be made on the basis given by its head in a recent interview in New York where he stated that he had no desire to accumulate wealth or to die rich, there will be no doubt as to the justice of the criticism of a plan that gives to an office boy the salary of a school superintendent, or makes the wages of a floor scrubber equal that of the skilled mechanic. It may and doubtless will continue to be eminently satisfactory to those who are fortunate enough to be on the pay roll of this company, but what of the dissatisfaction that must be engendered among other workers in similar lines? As if in proof of this question, papers from the East that

have been received since this article was started, tell of a demonstration in front of this factory, by a mass of unemployed and others who had left less lucrative positions, that was variously estimated at 10,000 persons. These demanded positions and employment on the basis of those already employed.
