WHAT IS THE BEST ROAD? DEPENDS ON CIRCUMSTANCES

Traffic the Chief Factor In Determin-

Given complete data as regards location, traffic and air other conditions. the expert in highway construction can adelse intelligently as to the kind of parement which will most nearly meet the requirements in a given cone, but without the complete information be enmot hope to give any satisfactory answer, says Good Roads.

Before the advent of the automobile. when the traffic consisted of horse drawn vehicles, equipped for the most drawn vehicles, equipped for the most part with iron tires, water bound mac-adam was the standard construction for practically all coads except those entrying the heaviest traffic. But pres-ent traffic conditions are different. The reblicles using the roads consist not only of horse drawn vehicles equipped with iron tires, but also of motor drivwith non-tires, but also or motor div-en vehicles equipped with rubber tires. Moreover, these two dissimilar kinds are found in varying proportions. At present there is no standard type of construction. Roads or streets carry-ing light traffic can be satisfactorily paved with certain materials, those exercises heavily traffic can be passed. currying a heavier traffic can be paved

properly with certain other materials, and those carrying the heaviest traffic require still other kinds of payements.

Considering these facts, the logical reachesion is that traffic is the chief factor in determining the type of con-arranton to be adopted. It is also known that the two different types of rebicles now using the highways re-quire different surfaces. It may be in-ferred, therefore, that so long as the traffic is mixed, and mixed in varying proportions, a presentent that will be universally satisfactory will not be found unless the amount of one or the other of the two kinds of truffle be-comes small enough to be negligible. We can be certain that motor driven reblehs will never become negligible factors, so that the next step to be taken is to consider whether or not the public between motor driven and horse drawn vehicles will ever become so great as to eliminate the latter from receideration. If this does happen the situation will be similar to that before the advent of the automobile, and we shall have a traffic varying only in in-leasity. 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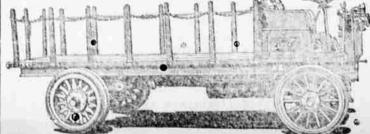
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
