For the benefit of those young high school students who wished some information as to the census figures on the number of Chinese in this country, we find from the complete census reports taken in the year 1910, that there were at that date 56,756 persons enumerated as having been born in China, as against 81,534 in 1900 and 106,701 in 1890, showing a marked decrease for this race during these two decades. This was offset, however, by the large increase of the Japanese and Asiatic Turks, the Japs from 2,292 in 1890 to 24,788 in 1900, and 67,744 in 1910. A striking part of this report is shown in the proportion of males to females of the Chinese 3,074 males to every 100 females, and among the Japs the proportion is 859. We give these statistics in order to rectify some other information we had already given, and which we have found to be inaccurate, and can vouch for its authenticity, as it is taken from the latest tables.
