

GOOD MEETING

Is Held at Commercial Club Last Evening.

SOCIAL EVIL IS ABLY DISCUSSED

Dr. House and Houck Describe The Dreaded Diseases That Result From the Social Evil—Other Speakers.

A half hundred well known citizens of Roseburg assembled at the Roseburg Commercial Club rooms last night in response to invitations sent out by the Oregon Hygiene Association, of Portland.

Mayor Napoleon Rice presided at the meeting, and in a brief introductory address told of the good that had been accomplished through the efforts of the Oregon Hygiene Association and its kindred organizations.

In concluding his remarks, Mayor Rice introduced Dr. House, of Portland, who is recognized as one of the foremost brain and nerve specialists on the Pacific coast.

In preliminary, Dr. House told of what was being done by the Oregon Hygiene Association along the lines of education. Although organized less than five years ago Dr. House said the society had made remarkable progress, and was today recognized as the leading hygiene association in the United States.

Dr. House then took up the subject of infectious diseases, which he laid bare before the assembly. He discussed the various ailments resulting from the social evil in plain language and presented statistics to substantiate his statements.

Dr. House said it was astonishing when one learned of the percentage of people in the United States that were suffering from social diseases. It was the statement of Dr. House that over 5,000 men and women in the United States die each year as the result of the social evil.

Dr. House presented statistics showing that the percentage of deaths from social diseases was increasing rapidly, and that something would have to be done in order to curb the malady which promises to exterminate the race.

Dr. House also spoke of the effect of the social diseases on the home. He contended that it was a shame for any young man to attempt marriage when he knew his condition was unfit.

Dr. House's address was one of the most instructive ever heard in this city and The News only regrets that the subject is one which cannot be discussed openly through the press.

The speaker was liberally applauded, indicating that those present had learned much regarding their anatomy.

Dr. George E. Houck was the second speaker of the evening. He spoke of the social diseases now prevailing throughout the entire world, and of the cure. Dr. Houck took up the diseases separately, and informed his listeners of the results in the event they failed to receive proper treatment.

Dr. Houck's opinion that the quack physicians of the country had done more to perpetuate the social evil than any other class of people. In the event you, or any of your family should contract a disease you should consult a reputable physician.

ians with the result that large sums of money were extracted from them without cause. In some of these instances the men were not suffering from an ailment, neither had they any indication of the disease for which the medicine was prescribed.

Dr. Houck said it was up to the parents to teach their children along the lines of hygiene, and thereby place them in a position to combat the social evil. "Boys and girls will learn these things," said Dr. Houck, "and it is better that they be taught at home."

B. W. Strong then spoke on the subject of the home. He said the parents were in a degree to blame for the conditions that existed among the boys and girls of today. Mr. Strong said the home should be made pleasant, thereby attracting the boy and girl. "You make home life pleasant," said Mr. Strong, "and I venture to say that much of the trouble resulting from the social evil will be eliminated."

Prof. Groves of the local public schools, said the morals of the average person were good when he was at work. "It is during leisure hours that the children—and older people get into trouble," said Mr. Groves. "I have heard people say that the school hours should be shortened. I believe the hours should be lengthened in the event the most good is to be accomplished."

Hon. O. P. Coshow said he coincided with the previous speakers, and believed the children should be taught those things which they should know by their parents. There is too much false modesty, said Attorney Coshow, "among the parents of today. They should talk to their children, and if possible prepare them for a life of purity."

Other meetings are to be held in Roseburg as soon as arrangements can be made. Different classes of people will be instructed on different occasions, and when the work is done much good will have been accomplished.

Every man present at last night's meeting went home feeling that he had learned something to his advantage.

The committee on music has already written to a number of bands throughout the state, and it is probable that at least two musical organizations will be engaged.

The committee on floats will begin work at once, and every business man in Roseburg will be asked to participate in the parade of floats while it costs considerable money to arrange a creditable float, the carnival committee feels that the entrant is well paid in the advertising he receives.

It is also planned to have a grand parade of decorated automobiles this year—probably on the first day of the carnival. Decorated automobiles always attract much attention, and are considered essential in success of the festival. In having this parade on the first day owners of automobiles will be given an opportunity to use their machines during the remainder of the festival.

Another feature of this year's festival will be the stock parade. Harry Pearce is chairman of the committee on livestock, and it is up to Harry to make good. He has already taken the work in hand, however, and says he will assemble the grandest display of livestock ever seen in this city.

The parade of decorated baby buggies, which will be held in conjunction with a babies' eugenic contest, will be another feature of this year's festival. The baby parade is always a feature, and probably attracts as much attention as any other part of the festival program.

The committee on attractions will get busy next week in order that the street shows presented this year may be better than those of past years. No show unless fully up to the standard, will be allowed here during the festival.
