Conductor John Roberts, of Northern Pacific train No. 314, enroute from Lewiston to Spokane, today issued this challenge to N. E. Heath, a prosperous young farmer, of Lenore, Idaho, and Mildred Kittrell, a belle of the Idaho.

Government Clerk on Trial

UPPER MERIDORE, Md., April 13.—Trial of William J. Fisher, clerk in the interstate commerce commission at Washington, on the charge of murdering William L. Aldorfer, a well known newspaper correspondent, at Chevy Chase, Md., last fall, was begun here today. A former trial at Rockville, Md., resulted in a disagreement, and Fisher obtained a change of venue. Interest today settled on the story to be told by Miss Lillian Reeves, Aldorfer's adopted daughter and the only witness to the killing. Fisher claims he sought to

protect Miss Reeves from Aldorfer's insults, and in a struggle with the man, who was intoxicated, he stabbed him with a pair of scissors.
