CARE OF MARES IN FOAL.

"There is a lot of nonsense about the care of a mare in foal," say the animal husbandry officers of the Oregon Agricultural college. "After she is bred she should be kept rather quiet for several hours, but after that the best thing she can have is steady work and three good meals a day. She should not be worked so hard as to become run down on good feed. If there is any slackening of work it should be about the fifth or sixth month. During the last three months she may do a lot of farm work such as plowing and harrowing, without injury clear up to the time she drops her foal. She will then be in a good condition to stand the physical strain and have her digestive system in good working order."
