Next year Roseburg is going to entertain the grand lodge of Odd Fellows, one of the strongest and best attended fraternal organizations in the state. If it is able to entertain the large number of delegates and visitors who are attracted on that occasion, why would it not be a good plan to secure more of these assemblages and make this known over the state as the Convention City. **THE COST IN DOLLARS.**

The staggering cost of the present war in material wealth can be dimly estimated when one reads the call made today by the English premier for another lump sum of one and one quarter billion dollars, and the announcement that England has already appropriated over seven billion since it started. It is said by the premier that the daily cost from now on will double that of the ten preceding months. A million is a great deal of money, and when this is multiplied one thousand times, the amount is stupendous. But the world has grown callous regarding enormous expenditures of both lives and money since this war began, and long death lists or huge expenses do not cause much comment, it is almost as if the world had arrived at that apathetic condition where the end only is waited.

**TASTING THEIR OWN MEDICINE**

For about the first time since the war began, Germany has a taste of the ravages of the new implements of war on her own sacred territory, for the dispatches today state that French aviators have crossed the historic basin of the Rhine and dropped some bombs on the beautiful city of Karlsruhe, the capital of the Grand Duchy of Baden. This far the Germans have managed to keep the desolation of the cities confined to other than their own on the western theatre, but with the extension of air flights, no section may now be considered secure.

**COST OF WAR IS DOUBLING**

Premier Asks For Billion And a Quarter Dollars.

**REPORT THAT WARSHIP SINKS IS DENIED**

Rumor Brought to United States By Passengers on Board An English Liner—London Denies It.

LONDON, June 15.—Premier Asquith called upon the house of commons for a new war appropriation of 1,216,525,000 dollars. England has spent 7,365,750,000 since war began, the premier said. He estimated the expenditure for carrying on the conflict during the coming year to be nearly double the daily cost of the war during the past ten months.

**Claim English Lose Warship.**  
NEW YORK, June 15.—Passengers on the Cunard liner Orduna from England, believe that the British dreadnaught Agamemnon was torpedoed and sunk in the Dardanelles three weeks ago. The passengers said they believed the loss of the dreadnaught was concealed by the British authorities. There were verbal rumors in London that the crew of the Agamemnon was saved, it is stated. The same passengers said it was believed that two submarines were trapped at the entrance to the English channel.

**Battleship Not Lost Is Report.**  
LONDON, June 12.—The official press bureau has formally denied that the dreadnaught Agamemnon was sunk in the Dardanelles.

**Trawler Sunk, 7 Perish.**  
LONDON, June 15.—The steam trawler Argyle was torpedoed and sunk by a submarine last night and seven of the crew perished. Later advices report the captain of the trawler as among the dead.
