SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—You can play a complete golf game of 18 holes, using all the clubs you like, on the roof of a downtown skyscraper here. There are many indoor courses in New York, but San Francisco claims the only real "up in the air" course.

The Olympic Club is responsible for the unique course and has constructed a 50-foot putting green of real turf on the skyscraper roof.
