THERE ARE A FEW.

It is now pretty generally known that a few poor deluded men in this city have joined issue and raised a pool of money sufficiently large to secure the services of an attorney who will endeavor to place obstructive tactics in the way of the proposed bond issue for the railroad, and defeat the expressed will of the large majority of the taxpayers as shown at the late election. It is not known just how many of them there are, or how much each one has subscribed to the fund, but if the current opinion as to their identity is correct, the majority of them have never been classed as being among the men who have had the advancement of their home city in view. There are some, no doubt, who are actuated by something else besides personal self interest, but they are in the minority. If there has been any equalization in the assessments for the sum raised, scarcely one but will have paid fully as much for his part as the increased tax will cost him for five years. Possibly some of these men were at the "Town Talk" by Nels Darling last night, some were not, that is sure, for they as a rule don't patronize anything of this nature, but those who were there could have taken some of the plain spoken words to themselves and profited by them, with an ultimate benefit to their own "Home Town".

The decision of District Attorney Neuner to expedite the case of homicide over at the Soldiers Home yesterday, and have the aged man who committed the deed committed to the state institute for feeble minded, or the asylum is one that will meet with very general commendation. From the examination of the old man today, it is very palpable that he is wandering and irrational. It would have been a travesty on justice to have him stand a trial, with commitment in the county jail until this could have been done. Aside from this it would have been a needless expense on a county which has had a surplus of this notoriety the past two years. If there is any criticism to be made, it should rest on the management of the Home for lax discipline in allowing such friction as the evidence discloses has been going on for some time between these two aged men, both in their second childhood.

If one is to judge from the applause that greeted the speaker last night, there is a large number of people who believe that the United States is furnishing nearly all the powder now being used in the European war. The statement was that an embargo placed on all war munitions by this government would soon settle the matter, or words to that effect. We wonder if most people realize that government experts have figured out that less than five per cent of all that is being daily used comes from this country, and that an embargo would of necessity include cotton also?

It is doubtful if there has ever been anywhere in the world such outbursts of patriotism over a memento of a nation, as is being shown to the old Liberty Bell in its triumphant journey from one side of the country to the other. Could all the crown jewels of England, all the iron crosses of Germany, awaken such spontaneous devotion and homage?

CITY NEWS.

Manager George Maple, of the Majestic theatre, said that over 1200 people saw the great film, Hypocrites, when it was here this week.

The board of examiners today examined Chas. R. Stimpson, the old soldier who yesterday struck and killed Alexander Church at the Soldiers Home. They found that the man was insane and it was decided to commit him to the state asylum. He will probably be taken to that institution on the early train tomorrow.

The merchants association and a number of the business men have raised a monthly contribution to be given to the boys' band in order to assist them in their work of furnishing the city with good music. A committee of Messrs. Marshall, McClintock and Dyringer have been working for a short time gathering subscriptions from the business men and have succeeded in raising a large amount to be used in assisting the band.

PURSE RAISED TO FIGHT BOND ISSUE

One of the chief topics of conversation heard upon the streets today was the action of a number of prominent realty owners of the city who had clubbed together and raised a purse which is to be used to fight the recent bond election in the courts. According to the report W. W. Cardwell has been retained by these few disgruntled parties who are of the opinion that the city is committing an act of bankruptcy in voting these bonds with which to start construction work.

One of the men who contributed to the purse was heard to say to one member of the council: "Just so long as the council holds its meetings with the Kendalls behind barred doors, that long will they meet with opposition from this particular clik of men." While a meeting was held with the Kendall party yesterday afternoon no attempt was made to have it a secret; it was merely an informal meeting and one called for the purpose of getting acquainted with the different members of the party more than anything else.

When the time comes for the purpose of ratifying an agreement with Kendalls or their representatives, it will be done in the council chambers of the city hall and full announcement of the meeting will be given in the papers so that every taxpayer, if he so desires can be present, so that they can be sure that the birthright of the city is not given away.
